

Presbyterian General Assembly.

AT WINNIPEG ON JUNE 7.

Annual meeting of the big Pres-

byterian General Assembly, will

be held in Winnipeg, Canada,

for a week commencing June

7. This important denomination-

meeting will be the 48th in the

history of this church, dating from

1782. The half century anniversary

of the united denomination is, there-

fore, rapidly approaching. The

fourth time the assembly has

been held in Winnipeg. The first was in

1822, when it was a very small and

poorly attended gathering. Since

then, its numbers have grown

rapidly. Two of the

representatives of the Winnipeg

meeting are Rev. F. B. Duval,

pastor of the St. John's church,

and Rev. A. B. Baird, D.D., who

is a citizen of a city which has

grown to cosmopolitan proportions

in a population of 200,000.

Every Assembly is important,

and on its own programme, and

will be no exception to the rule.

There is a financial turnover in a year

of \$1,000,000; that has 2,000 mis-

sionaries and 4,000 congregations; that

draws nearly as many Sunday

schools with an enrolment of 320,

teachers and teachers, is a big

business in itself. When there is

the work of 325 missionaries

in foreign fields—China, India,

Formosa, India and the Brit-

ish West Indies—it will be seen that

the programme of the denomination

is a big one, especially when it is

considered that modern missions work

is confined to direct evangelism,

which is still basic, but cov-

ers educational, and other

forms of Christian service of the

highest quality. The reports of

the various activities, as well as the

work of many missionaries on

the ground, will, in itself, provide a

very interesting study.

CHURCH UNION.

Among the subjects for re-

view and discussion naturally comes

the union of the denomination

with the general assembly of 1921, fur-

nishing the proposed organic

union of the Presbyterian,

Methodist and Congregational

churches, following the union of non-

controversy, observed during the

war. Since that time, the committee

on Union, representing the three de-

nominations, has met and passed the

following resolution: "That a stand-

ing committee on Law and Legisla-

tion be appointed to consider and re-

port on the legislation necessary to

give effect to the Union of the nego-

tiating Churches and to have pre-

pared copies of all proposed bills to

be submitted to the Parliament of

Canada, and to such other legisla-

tive bodies as may be necessary. It is

promised, to be submitted to a fur-

ther meeting of this Committee, and

further, that the Law and Legisla-

tion Committee have power to secure

the necessary legal assistance."

UNION REPORT A BASIS.

The above represents the present

situation. A report from the Union

Committee representing the three

Churches, as well as from the Pres-

byterian Committee appointed by the

General Assembly of 1921, will in all

probability, be submitted and form

the basis for further discussion and

action. What these reports will

cover can only be conjectured. The

main Union Committee will probably

bring in a report of progress as to

the information gathered thus far

bearing on the prospective legisla-

tion. It is hardly likely that the

Committee will be able to cover all

the Parliamentary and legislative as-

pects of what will admittedly be a

complicated question, with many

ramifications: both legislative and

legal. Apart from or in addition to

The Housewife's Golden Rules.

Order and method are essential to good housekeeping. Anyone can clean and tidy up at odd times, but to keep clean and tidy is the good housewife's aim, and accordingly she has two golden rules: "A place for everything and everything in its place," and "Do it now." For example, wash and replace a cup,

or plate, or jar, immediately after using it; wipe up at once anything that has been spilled on the floor; instead of leaving it to be trodden on and carried about the house; pick up scraps, cuttings, etc., and put away sewing materials as soon as they are finished with; never leave a room untidy, but if you see something out of its place, take a moment to put it right before going out. These will soon become habits, and save much trouble and unnecessary work. The house has never got time to get untidy, and with regular methodical cleaning, will never be dirty or neglected.

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
