Pitprop Fraud Charge.

CASE DISMISSED. Inspector General Hutchings has returned from Placentia where he had been in connection with a charge of fraud preferred against Mr. Thos. Walsh of Point Verde. It will be remembered that Walsh the principal in the pitprop case in which it was charged that the pile had been padded with boughs, and otherwise allowed so as to make it measure large and deceive the Crown Lands Department under which the timber was cut. The case came up on Friday before Magistrate O'Reilly, Inspector General Hutchings prosecuting. W. J. Higgins, K.C., represented the accused. It was proved that a number of short ends had been put in the pile, but of this Mr. Walsh had no knowledge. The case was dismissed.
