London Doctors  
Announces a Palliative  
for Tuberculosis.

More Effective Inoculation System Calculated to Ease and in Some Cases Cure Disease. Vaccine has Remarkable Effect on Animals, Dr. Dreyer says in Explaining New Discovery.

LONDON, June 16.—Humanity is offered a palliative, if not a cure for tuberculosis by Professor Georges Dreyer, distinguished doctor of Oxford University, the basis of his treatment is described as a more effective system of inoculation than has hitherto been known. In explaining his discovery at the Institute of Pathology and Research of St. Mary's hospital, Professor Dreyer declared that remarkable cures had been effected with the new vaccine on guinea pigs and other animals, and that great improvement had been effected in the cases of persons suffering from tuberculosis, blood poisoning, anthrax and other diseases. He pointed out that in the inoculation of human beings, dead bacteria were used. In order to be successful the microbes must be digested and destroyed by the tissues of the patient, but a coating of fat which covered some microbes prevented the juices of the body from getting at them. He explained that his new system was to destroy the fat surrounding these germs thus making them more easily destroyed by vaccine injections. London physicians who have used the new treatment declared the benefit derived from tuberculosis inoculations as much greater than from the other

forms of treatment in use. They report complete cures in some advanced cases of tuberculosis affecting various parts of the body.

## Angina Pectoris Cure.

REPORTED FROM VIENNA.

LONDON.—General interest was created at a meeting of the Medical Congress in Vienna, says a London Daily Mail Exchange message, by a statement of Professor Wenckelbach on the treatment of angina pectoris. By an operation, he said, total relief could be obtained from its pains. "Attempts have been made before to cure this agonizing disease, which may be described as cramp of the heart, by operation, and with some success," said a doctor to a Daily Mail reporter. "Dr. Jennesse, a French surgeon by excising a small portion of a nerve (the left cervical sympathetic nerve) completely cured a man who for years had been suffering from severe pain. The report does not indicate the nature of Professor Wenckelbach's operation. Although there are many theories we are quite in the dark as to what causes angina pectoris, from which women rarely suffer. It is mostly a disease of men of the better classes, and is particularly common among doctors and among Jews. Mental strain and worry predispose to it. Over 700 people die in England every year from it, as it is not at all uncommon."

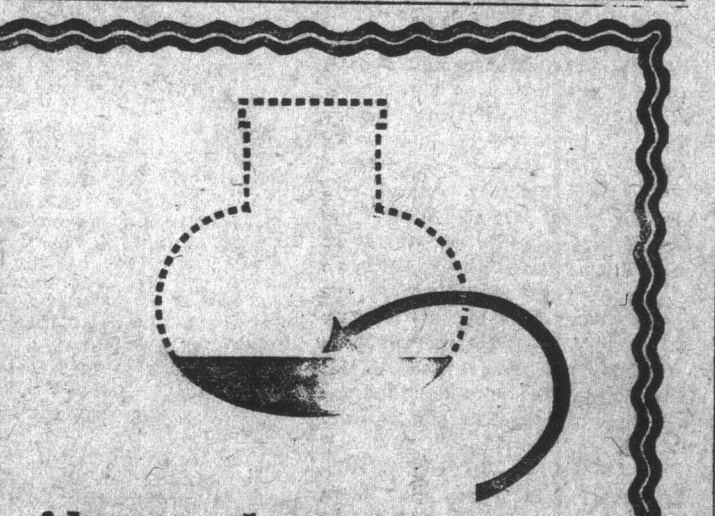

A large crowd was present and a feeling of sincere regret at the departure of the Colonel and his wife was manifested throughout the entire proceeding. Words of farewell were spoken by Mrs. Adjutant Woodland, Commandant Sainsbury, Sergt. Majors Barter, Cummings, and Pike, Capt. W. Jennings, Adj. French and Staff Capt. R. Sainsbury. All paid glowing tributes to the splendid work accomplished by the Colonel and his wife since coming to Newfoundland and expressed sincere regret that the time for parting had come.

Staff Capt. Tilley, General Secretary, who will have charge of affairs until the new Territorial Commander arrives, voiced the feelings of the Headquarters staff regarding the farewell of Col. and Mrs. Martin. They had, he said, proven themselves true friends and wise counsellors and Newfoundland would be the better for their labours. Mrs. Martin spoke of the joy she had experienced in visiting the homes of the sick and infirm, especially in the outports. During the past winter she had been deprived of this pleasure owing to the condition of her health and she regretted this very much. She admired Newfoundlanders for their absence of pretence and guile and the strength and simplicity of their faith. She paid a high tribute to the members of the home league for their untiring efforts in pushing forward every good work and wished them much success in the future. She was pleased to count among her friends many who were not Salvationists and she wished to thank them also for the many acts of kindness shown to herself and the Colonel during their stay here. While the Colonel was confined to his home through illness she received many kind inquiries and expressions of sympathy by telephone and otherwise and she assured one and all that every kindness was appreciated to the fullest extent.

Before proceeding to address the gathering, the Colonel announced the promotion of Cadets Ivany, Hewitt, Little, Peters, and Fitzgerald to the rank of Probationary. These young people had been highly recommended by him, by the training college principal and he had much pleasure in awarding them the new rank.

Referring to his work here the Colonel stated that he was able to report substantial advances in almost every branch of the work. Fourteen new halls had been opened, ten new day schools, the number of officers increased in spite of the fact that some twenty-eight had been transferred to Canada and the United States, and although we are passing through a period of depression and money is unusually scarce the total amount raised in connection with this year's Self Denial effort exceeds all previous amounts by several hundred dollars. He felt that all this was due in a large measure to the faithfulness and devoted work done by Salvationists of all ranks and he expressed hearty thanks and appreciation to all who helped to bring about such good results. He had much pleasure in announcing that Colonel and Mrs. Cloud would be the new leaders for Newfoundland, and he commended them to the love and affection of all Salvationists. Col. Cloud is an officer of thirty-seven years standing, and has filled many important positions in the old country. He is at present in charge of the S. A. Forces in the Welsh sub-territory. In conclusion the Colonel assured those present of his warm appreciation of the devoted service rendered him since coming here and his sincere wishes for their future happiness.

Before closing the congregation sang "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," and the Colonel pronounced the benediction.

## Minerals in Canada.

Mineral production in Canada during 1922 is estimated to be worth \$180,622,000, an increase of practically \$6,000,000 over the production of the previous year, according to a preliminary report of the Bureau of Statistics. The value of the metals produced was \$61,751,000 as compared with \$49,248,232 in the preceding year; fuels and other non-metals dropped \$4,000,000 to a total of \$83,871,000, and the production of structural materials and clay products has been estimated at the same valuation as last year, namely, \$35,000,000.
