Schools in Ireland.

The Dublin correspondent of the London Times (but an unprejudiced authority) writing on the 21st, says:—No time has been lost in carrying into effect the declaration of war against the model schools which were pronounced in the resolutions of the Irish Roman Catholic prelates. On Sunday last a pastoral in the spirit of Cardinal Cullen's was read from the altar in Limerick, by order of the bishop, calling upon parents to withdraw their children from the model schools, on pain of being deprived of the rites of the church. This terrible power has already been exercised in this diocese with remorseless rigor, so that in a county where the Roman Catholic population largely preponderates, the denominational proportions in the schools are reversed and the Protestant children avail themselves of the advantages of the national system to more than double the extent that the Roman Catholics do. It appears by the last report of the commissioners, that the number of pupils on the rolls in the schools of the county of Limerick was 684, of whom 381 were members of the Established Church, 184 were Roman Catholics, 80 Presbyterians, and 71 belonged to other denominations. This new edict has been issued to effect the withdrawal of the comparatively few children whose parents had the courage to resist clerical oppression. This will not be confined to primary education. The prelates only await the grant of a charter to the Catholic University to bring the same system of spiritual terrorism to bear in every diocese against the Queen's University, and establish on its ruins what will in reality prove to be the most intolerable of all "educational monopolies."
