ALL OTTAWA SHOCKED BY THE EXPLOSION

Many Killed While in Houses Far From the Fire

Ottawa, May 8.—Probably fifteen persons were killed and from 40 to 50 more or less seriously injured, some of whom may die, in an explosion at the plant of the General Explosives company of Montreal, in the Wriglington district on the outskirts of the city of Hull, a few minutes before 6 o'clock this evening.

Some died while reaching the hospitals. Tonight the services of a squad of policemen was necessary at Water Street hospital to keep out the crowd of friends anxious to see or hear of the condition of loved ones within.
