The claim amounts to nearly \$1,000,000 in silver, also interest. Over twenty years ago one Gama, a Brazilian, obtained rights from the Bolivian Government for guano deposits at Mexillones. Alsop advanced Gama large sums of money, but a disagreement arose between them as to the guano deposits. Then the Bolivians passed a law granting Alsop a piece of land for every mine found on the Bolivian coast district. After the war between Chili and Bolivian in 1880 this concession was disallowed by the Chilians. Since then the matter has been in statu quo.
