THE WEATHER PROPHET.

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 8-11 p.m.—The storm center mentioned last night as near the mouth of the Bay of Fundy proved to be a rapidly moving cyclone, which gave a heavy rain in the Maritime Provinces during the night. The pressure is now highest over the lake region. Little below the average in the Northwest Territories, and about average over the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The weather is fine throughout the country.

Minimum and maximum temperatures:

Calgary, 40°-50°; Battleford, 40°-50°; Swift Current, 30°-40°; Qu'Appelle, 40°-50°; Winnipeg, 30°-40°; Toronto, 60°-70°; Montreal, 50°-60°; Quebec, 50°-60°; Halifax, 60°-70°.

Toronto, Sept. 9-1 a.m.—The indications for the next 24 hours for the lower lake region governing the pressure and as far east as Belleville are: Moderate winds; fine weather; stationary or higher temperature.

—Mrs. R. D. Kilgour, of Elmwood avenue, South London, has returned home after a three months' stay at Goderich and northern points.

—Mrs. Brunsell, accompanied by her son, Geo. Hyde, of New Westminster, B. C., is visiting at the residence of her brother, R. T. Lough, city.

—W. R. Meredith, M.P.P., will reach Toronto from Switzerland on Sept. 12. Mrs. Meredith and the Misses Meredith will remain in Switzerland for a year.

—On Sunday at St. Peter's Cathedral, Peterboro, Rev. Timothy Francis Collins, of Lindsay, was ordained to the priesthood of the Roman Catholic Church by Bishop O'Connor.

—Although tomatoes are a large crop the cold weather of the past few weeks has retarded the ripening of the luscious "love apple."

—John Wells, manager of the London Furniture Company, is home again after an extended trip to England and the continent.

—Mrs. George Bragg, of Hamilton, Ohio, returned home Monday after having spent five weeks visiting with Mr. J. Hartley, of East London.

—Mrs. Whitaker was dismissed by the police magistrate yesterday on a charge of breach of the peace by disturbing the peace.

—James Greenaway was allowed one week by the police magistrate yesterday to repair the damage to Dundas street, which he opened up to lay a sewer pipe.

—Mr. Yanvick, manager of Wees' Hotel at Winnebago, was in town yesterday. He reports a very successful season for the hotel and that it is growing in popularity each year.

—Jack Mack, the young man arrested Monday on a charge of the larceny of a gold watch and three gold rings, was remanded by the police magistrate until Sept. 14.

—Miss Mary Osborne, niece of Mrs. Clarke, Horton street, has returned from Chicago, where she has been visiting her parents, and intends making this her permanent home.

—Mr. and Mrs. James Gillen left yesterday on a visit to their son, Wm. D. Gillen, of the Canada Paper Company, Montreal. They take the steamer Persia to St. Catharines this afternoon, intending to be absent for a few weeks.

—The charge of driving over the sidewalk near the C. P. R., preferred by Engineer Graydon against Wm. Higby, was withdrawn at the Police Court yesterday. The defendant did no damage and promised not to repeat the offense.

—John McCready, at one time assistant station master of the G. T. R. here, and who lately had his arm cut off while coupling cars at Port Erie, arrived in the city Monday and was taken to the hospital. He is doing splendidly and looks well.

—Engineer Graydon in charge of the Council committee having the matter in charge spent Monday afternoon in selecting a fountain, etc., for the diamond on the Richmond street gore, which will soon be finished and will greatly enhance the appearance of that neighborhood.

—"Charlie," the well-known family horse, the property of Rev. W. T. Hill, died Monday morning. He had been suffering from an attack of inflammation for several days, combined with the enforced lack of nourishment, being unable to eat, was the cause of his demise.

—James Westbrook was at the Police Court yesterday on a charge of doing damage to the property of Miss Mary Allister, East London. The damage amounted to \$30. The defendant will pay \$15 and balance of month's rent, without prejudice to the right of the plaintiff to sue for more.

—The police magistrate yesterday fined Edward Keys \$10 or two weeks for assaulting Silas Stewart, on the corner of Adelaide and Grey streets last Saturday afternoon. Stewart has the use of only one arm, and from appearances was pretty badly thrashed, the defendant striking him two or three times when he was lying insensible on the ground.

—Edward Fossit again appeared before the police magistrate yesterday on a charge of stealing four ferrets from C. H. Carter, of South London. He acknowledged stealing one ferret and it has been recovered. The case was enlarged for a week, during which Fossit will either replace the missing three ferrets or pay cash value for them.

—J. H. Winnett, of No. 5 ward, has again returned to Toronto for the purpose of completing his time under articles, he having passed his barrister and solicitor examination last May. Mr. Winnett deserves much credit as being the only student in the existence of the Law Society of Upper Canada who has ever taken the final examinations in the fourth year. His many friends wish him every success.

—The case against Robert E. Walker of breach of a city by-law, in blocking up a sidewalk on the east side of Market Lane with baskets of fruit, was adjourned for a week at the Police Court yesterday. It appears John Coote, from whom the defendant rents the store, owns the property to the width of six feet from the edge of the building. The sidewalk has been there 20 years and has been closed up several times.

—The regular meeting of South London Circle of King's Daughters was held Monday night in St. James' Church. The president, Miss Racey, occupied the chair, and after a large amount of regular monthly business had been disposed of, delegates to the Toronto convention were elected. Miss Racey and Miss Johnston being chosen. The convention meets on Oct. 6 and 7. The circle has about 180 members now, with a regular attendance of about 65.

—Silas Stewart, of this city, who has been spending his college vacation in Rupert's Land, at the same time taking charge of the mission at that place, on the eve of his departure to continue his studies was presented with an address and \$100 in gold. He will matriculate at Toronto University.

—T. R. Parker, formerly C. P. R. city ticket agent, was seen by George Priddis on his recent visit to England. His many friends will be glad to learn that Mr. Parker has completely recovered his health, and that he expects to leave England for this city in a week or two.

Presentation to a Missionary.

At the close of the regular meeting of the Y. Y. S. C. R. of King Street Presbyterian Church Monday evening, Eli Allen, who is about to leave for New York, where he will spend a few weeks before proceeding to Northwest Texas to take charge of the Industrial School, under the United States Presbyterian Board of Missions, was made the recipient of a magnificent Oxford Bible and a copy of Farrar's "Life of Christ," accompanied by an address, from the young people of the church. Miss Bella Cole read the address and W. A. Babcock made the presentation. Mr. Allen, although taken by surprise, made a feeling reply.

No Shot His Brother.

A Winnipeg dispatch of Monday's date says: Genus Webb, who shot his brother near Balder Station on the Northern Pacific and Manitoba branch on Friday, was brought to the city yesterday and lodged in the Provincial jail. Genus loaded his gun in the morning and went out to shoot prairie chickens. He met his brother and they began quarreling over the division of the wheat on their farm. Harrison dared Genus to touch the gun. There was an interchange of passionate words, and suddenly Genus put his gun to his shoulder and leveled it at his brother, who was two rods away. The heavy charge of shot struck Harrison on the neck and the left breast, inflicting frightful wounds. The shooting was witnessed by two men, a third brother and a halfbrother, who were working in the field. They at once took flight and notified neighbors of the terrible occurrence. Genus, when he saw his brother bleeding on the ground, carried water to the wounded man, who had been the victim of his rage, and laved his neck and shoulders with the hope of undoing what he had done. When he saw neighbors coming he left. He made no attempt to escape from the district, and submitted quietly to arrest when found shortly afterwards. There are four Webb brothers living near Balder, three of whom live together, Genus living by himself, unmarried. Their father lives in London, Ont., where he is a well-known builder. He assists his sons in Manitoba frequently. Webb states that he blames his brothers for what occurred as they goaded him into doing the shooting. He says also that they threatened on more than one occasion to do the same to him. He says that his two brothers had nearly beaten the life out of him, and he was getting even with them. He disclaims any intention of murdering his brother, but only wanted to give his brother a good scare and perhaps make him smart deeply for what he had done in the past. Latest accounts from Balder say the wounded man is still alive, but chances of recovery are very slim.
