MERCIER IS DEAD!

The Great French-Canadian Succumbs After Long Suffering.

His Dying Hours-- Unconscious at the Last-Peculiar Prophecy.

MONTREAL, Oct. 30 .- Honore Mercier died this morning at 8:45. The end had been expected any time during the preceding 24 hours. Mr. Mercier has been suffering from a complication of diseases for years past, diabetes predominating. After his defeat at the general elections of March, 1892, his friends expressed the opinion that he had only six menths to live, but by dint of adopting abstemious habits of living he managed to prolong existence longer than had been expected. a few weeks ago have nothing to do with The last rites of the church were adthis election. You must register if you ministered by the Rev. Father Garceau. S. J. It is a remarkable fact that a spiritualist here had foretold about ten days ago that the end would come on Oct. 30. Yesterday Mr. Mercier was unconscious most of the time. For ten hours of the day he lay in a coma tose condition, reviving at intervals for a few seconds and then relapsing into a state that was almost akin to death. Mr. Mercier at a late hour last evening was very weak. Morphine was administered at 10:40 and the patient became much agitated. It was then feared by the physicians that a reaction would take place and the end might come any minute. Throughout the night the vital spark flickered, growing lower and lower until the end came. Mr. Mercier in his prime would have weighed close onto 185 pounds. His dead body is now a mere skeleton, so much has he wasted away. Notwithstanding that Mr. Mercier's death was expected at any time the news has created great interest here and the bulletin boards containing the information were soon surrounded by growds eager to learn the particulars of the once great French-Canadian's last hours. He was surrounded at death by Madame

Mercier and his children, Madame Decahe, her sister and his brother, Edward. The funeral will take place on Friday at the Church of the Jesn.

#### THE GRAND TRUNK!

Sir Henry Tyler Defeated on the First Vote.

On a Motion to Pass Accounts-Another Ballot Will Be Taken-Hisses and Cheers.

London, England, Oct. 30. -At a meet ing of shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway this afternoon, Sir Henry Tyler,

president of the company, moved to adopt the report and accounts. Mr. Searle, a shareholder, moved an amendment that the report and accounts be received, but that their adoption be postponed until result of investigation of

accounts to be made in Canada by an expert shall be made. The amendment was voted upon and carried by a vote of 161 to 160. Sir Henry Tyler challenged the vote,

and it was decided to have a reballot tonight, the result to be announced at 11 o'clock tomorrow. The directors upon entering the meeting were greeted with hisses and cheers in

about even proportion. Sir Henry Tyler said he had always hitherto spent two months in Canada in the autumn of each year but everything had become so astrous and wages so greatly reduced during 1894 that he had not gone this year, because his presence there would have caused applications for an increase of wages, as well as applications for employment which could not be granted.

In a Tenement - Freedman's Thrilling Escape-Most of the Victims Died Peace ully.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.-Flames flashed with marvelous rapidity from the cellar to the roof of the five-story single tenement, No. 216, west Thirty-second street, early this morning. Smoke filled the entire house, and seven of the tenants were suffocated in their rooms.

Their names are: Andie Appleblam, 22 years old; George Freedman, 4 years; Levi Freedman, 3 years; Mrs. Margaret Killian, 70 years old; Jacob Killian, 4 years old, son of Mrs. Margaret Killian; George Lorey, 20 years old, grandson of Mrs. Killian; Mrs. Lena Mitchell, 24 years old, a cousin cf Mrs. Lena Freedman Injured-Mrs. Lena Freedman, 28 years

old, leaped from a window. The house contained seven families. All those in the front escaped, but while they were being rescued a tragedy was being enacted in the rear apartments on the second floor where Nathan Freedman, a furrier, was making a mad fight to save his family and himself from death. He awoke to find his bedroom full of smoke, and picking up Esther, the youngest of his three children, a babe of 4 months, Freedman made his way to the hall door, The flames had reached that floor, and the fire drove him dazed and half fainting from the intense heat to the kitchen. He called his wife and bade her follow him, but the woman became crazed and did not

obey. Freedman made his way to a corner window and rapidly descended a ladder, expecting his wife would follow. He heard a scream and saw his wife shoot downward from a window. She sustained no broken bones, but her clothing were ablaze, and before it could be extinguished the woman was probably fatally burned. Freedman started back to get his other children. It was too late. Mrs. Freedman's heartrending cries for her children

Neither of the girls had moved, apparently, and their faces looked peaceful enough. On the floor above, Jacob Killian was found doubled up as if he had made an effort to crawl through the window and had been overcome in the act. Geo. Lovey had also managed to get out of bed and his body was found on the floor. Aged Mrs. Killian had died just as she slept, and a peaceful smile rested on her furrowed face. The damage to the building is estimated at not more than \$300. The losses of the tenants, however, will swell the total damage to a

much larger figure.
