—The employees of Leonard & Sons and the London and Petrolia Coal Company picnic at Port Stanley on Saturday next.

—The many friends of Messrs. Joseph Fitzpatrick and John Milne, C.P.R. freight brakemen, of this city, are congratulating them upon their recent promotions to the ranks of conductors.

—Charles Swan, a young resident of South London, was thrown from his wheel yesterday while coasting down the hill on the Wortley road, at the Grand Trunk crossing. He was stunned for some time by the fall.

—The London Furniture Company are again employing their full staff. The new patterns have been worked up during the recent dull period, and in all probability the shops will operate steadily until next summer at least.

—Rev. Mr. McKay, who has taken charge of St. Andrew's congregation, Nairn, during the absence of the pastoring, leaves this week for South London to take charge of Rev. Mr. Stuart's pulpit at Knox Church during the absence of the latter.

—Mary McCall, Belmont, writes, in much anxiety, asking if any "Advertiser" readers could tell her the surname of a woman known as Susan, who was a nurse or servant in the General Hospital fifteen or sixteen years ago, and who afterwards kept house for a pensioner here, named Joe Parker.

—For the purpose of sending delegates to the great Home Rule Convention to be held shortly in Ireland, meetings have been held in various cities in Canada. London has lagged behind, but it is understood that some of our citizens of Irish extraction have been considering the matter, and will shortly make a move.

—A man, in alighting from trolley car No. 76 last evening at the corner of Talbot and Dundas streets, missed his footing and sprawled on the pavement. He was carrying a large framed picture, which was badly demolished. The shattering of the glass as it struck the pavement attracted quite a crowd.

—The Wortman & Ward Manufacturing Company, with a capital of \$100,000, is seeking incorporation. The applicants are: Wm. H. Wortman, Thos. E. Pound (Aylmer), Albert E. Passmore, A. B. McKay, P. Stomman, Messrs. W. H. Wortman, T. E. Pound and A. B. McKay are to be the first directors of the company.

—The will of the late Mrs. Henry M. Mathewson has been filed for probate. Dr. Cl. T. Campbell and Mr. George A. Somerville, manager of the Home & Erie Savings Company, are sole executors and trustees. The estate, which is valued at \$40,000, consists of a fine double brick residence on Central avenue, opposite Victoria Park, money invested on mortgages, bank and other stocks. Dr. Campbell and Mrs. Hal-dane, sister to Mrs. Mathewson, are appointed guardians of little Mai, the 10-year-old daughter, who inherits almost all the property. In the event of her death, her portion of the estate will be divided among the relatives of the late Mrs. Mathewson. Dr. Lancaster, Mrs. Mathewson's father, was married three times, and she was a daughter of the first wife. To her brothers and sisters by that marriage she leaves small legacies. Those who will benefit are: Thomas, William and David Lancaster; Mrs. Lancaster, Wellington road, and Mrs. Abigail Mill, Lambeth. Miss Jane Wilson, of Woodstock, receives a small amount. Mrs. so does Dr. Joseph R. Lancaster. The Protestant Orphans' Home is given \$100.

It was announced that Miss Slack, of England, corresponding secretary of the World's W. C. T. U. would probably lecture in this city in the early autumn. Mrs. (Rev.) T. S. Johnson will preside at the next meeting, when an interesting programme will be provided.

Bothwell's Boom.
The Community Excited Over the Oil Prospects.

Old Wells Revived—Several Good Strikes—Drillers Arriving.
Two prominent Londoners visited the Bothwell oil fields the other day, and found the town ablaze with excitement, and the residents, inspired with the hope that the oil boom of 30 years ago was reviving in full force. Several of the oil wells have been cleaned out, and their depth increased, and are producing a steady flow of oil, with every evidence of maintaining a production in paying quantities. Several new wells have been drilled, and property has been leased miles in radius. A number of sales at advanced prices have been made, and the farmers are of the opinion that the millennium is close at hand.

Mr. E. J. Carman, an expert from the Pennsylvania fields, has been prospecting and drilling for the past six months, and has every confidence in the Bothwell field. His well on the Goodier farm is producing six barrels per day. The Carman & Elliott well on the Luke farm struck oil on Thursday last, and on Friday was producing twenty barrels daily. Mr. Hiram Walker, the noted distiller, has a good well on the Goodier farm. This well is to be shot, which will add considerably to the output. He has commenced operations on Philip McDonald's farm in Oxford township, and has drilled down about a hundred feet. He has secured Pennsylvania experts to drill, and has imported an entire outfit of new machinery. He certainly means business. The Detroit Oil Company, under the management of Mr. F. W. Wright, of Pennsylvania experience, have acquired considerable land. They struck oil on the Charles Allen farm and produced in three hours, from personal observation, ten barrels. It is the intention of the company to make a test of five or more wells.

Messrs. McDonald and Crowell have cleaned out and deepened the old Gutter well on the former's place, which yields about twenty barrels a day. A Chatham company has secured lease of the Goodier farm, and will commence operations this week.

Drillers are heading towards Bothwell and competition among them is very keen. Startling developments may be looked for any day.

Finished the Task.

The Commission Decides on the Division of Middlesex

Into Eight Sections for County Council Purposes—The Divisions.

Judges Bell and Doyle have finished their task of dividing the county and have submitted their report to County Clerk Robson. This report is practically the same as foreshadowed in the "Advertiser" of Tuesday, and the divisions, with the equalized assessed value of real and personal property in each, are as follows:

No. 1—McGillivray, Biddulph and Lucan; property value, \$4,686,790.
No. 2—East and West Williams, Parkhill and Alisa Craig; property value, \$3,283,120.
No. 3—Township of London; property value, \$5,045,905.

No. 4—West Nissour and North Dorchester; property value, \$4,485,341.
No. 5—Westminster, Delaware and London West; property value, \$4,460,962.
No. 6—Caradoc and Lobo; property value, \$4,401,896.
No. 7—Ekfrid, Mosa, Glenoe, Newbury and Wardville; property value, \$3,339,945.

The total equalized real and personal property assessment of the county is \$34,138,024.

The councilors who attended the commission will receive \$21 60. Their total mileage was 228, at 19 cents a mile, and 19 days, at \$3 a day.

FIRE AT RODNEY.
Rodney, July 28—Yesterday morning, while the family were at breakfast, the farm house of John Somerville, about one and a half miles north of this place, was discovered to be on fire. Owing to the blaze having gained such headway before being discovered, it was impossible to save the house, and all was lost except the furniture of one room. Mr. Somerville, while attempting to secure some of the household effects from an upper room, was overcome by the smoke and fell down the stairs. A couple of men rushed in and rescued him from the flames. The loss is \$2,500; insurance, \$1,000.
