**SHOT DEAD.**  
**Former Windsor Woman Killed by**  
**C. R. Moulton, of Seattle, Wash.,**  
**Who Then Commit Suicide.**  
SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 7.—Charles  
Moulton last night shot and killed  
Mrs. M. S. Storey, residing at 416 Marion  
street, and then shot himself dead. Mrs.  
Storey was the daughter of a clergyman in

Moulton was 28 years old and was a real estate dealer. He came here from San Francisco two years ago. He had constantly referred Mrs. Storey's attentions, which she slighted, and when he asked her to marry him she positively refused.

He then shot her in the left temple and fired the pistol into his own mouth. Both died instantly. Mrs. Storey leaves two sons, aged 11 and 13 years.
