—We, Talbot and C. Hawkins, of Arva, have gone to Chicago to visit the fair.

—Mr. F. Twomey, of the C. P. R., has gone on a visit to Chicago and the World's Fair.

—Mr. Chas. Tane and wife have returned home after a two weeks' visit to Chicago and the fair.

—Mrs. Robinson, of York street, accompanied by Miss Katie Murray, have left for the World's Fair.

—Miss Belling, artist, has a very fine painting, "The Return Home," in the window of Reid's Crystal Hall.

—Prof. Saunders, of Ottawa, was in the city Sunday. He was on his way to Chicago to represent Canada at the Agricultural Congress.

—Mr. Ed Whittaker, formerly train dispatcher at the G. T. R. station here, but now of the Central Vermont road, is in the city on a visit.

—Mr. J. W. Wheaton, secretary of the Western Dairyman's Association, leaves to-day for St. Catharines, and will address a few daily meetings in Lincoln county during the next few days.

—Mr. John Campbell, the well-known London, Ont., carriage-maker, and Mr. Alex. Taylor, the wholesale firm of Fraser, McMillan & Co., in that city, arrived from the east yesterday and registered at the Leland.—(Winnipeg Free Press.)

—Building permits have been granted to J. J. Smyth for a brick workshop on the corner of King and Clarence streets; to D. S. Perrin for the erection of a brick stable, with slate roof, on Carling street, and to Mrs. S. J. O'Neil for the erection of a two-story brick shop on the premises of J. D. O'Neil, V.S., Talbot street.

—Miss Marion Oliver, M.D., one of the medical missionaries of the Presbyterian Church in Canada at Indore, Hindustan, who after seven years' valuable service to the cause of the Christian mission in the Central India in the lecture room of St. Andrew's Church this evening, Dr. Oliver is a lady of great ability, and will be much to the interest of the Christian workers of this city.

—Despite the wet weather an immense congregation listened with rapt attention to the address of Rev. J. W. Annis at Queen's Avenue Methodist Church last evening on "The Mummies and Their Message." The speaker dealt with the mummy of Ramses the Great Sunday night, and his discourse was pronounced the best of the series. Mr. Annis' descriptive powers are remarkable, and are marked by great plausibility of imagery. The lessons he drew from the mummies were striking and appropriate. The series will be continued next Sunday evening.

"Jane," which is to be given here next Thursday evening, is a comedy that appears to be well adapted for winter and summer audiences alike. It has been played to crowded houses everywhere, regardless of the weather. The piece ran in Chicago last summer without fear of the cold and has been the success of the season. Mr. Frohman presents his principal New York cast here, with Miss Kitty Cheatham as Jane, and Mr. Robert Cotton in his original character of William "Chum," of the selected New York Herald prize plays, a one-act curtain-raiser, will precede "Jane." Seats now on sale.

—The annual harvest home thanksgiving services in connection with St. Matthew's Church, East London, were held Sunday morning. Rev. F. E. Roy preached in the morning, and Rev. Principal Miller, of Huron College, in the evening, giving an earnest and eloquent sermon, with an attentive listening to by a large congregation. The church was beautifully and tastefully decorated for the occasion, and the special music by the choir was well rendered under the leadership of Miss Tibbs, the organist. The harvest home thanksgiving dinner in connection with the above church will be held in the East End Town Hall this evening.

Death at the Barracks.

No. 1 Company, R. C. R. I., lost one of its members by death Sunday in the person of E. H. Allbro, a native of Halifax, and who had been connected with the company for about three years. He had been in failing health for some time, but few thought he was so near, and just before noon he passed peacefully away. He was most respectfully commended to his family and friends, and his funeral will probably be this afternoon.

Collision at Woodstock.

A Woodstock dispatch says: About 5:30 this (Monday) morning freight train No. 41 from the east loaded with stone collided with another freight on the G. T. R. main line at Woodstock station, resulting in considerable damage, but no one was hurt, and there was no delay to through traffic. The grade from Eastwood to Woodstock is downward, and owing to the frost on the

rails the engineer of No. 417 could not get control of his train in time to avert the collision. The engineer of No. 417 was George Kettle, of London, and the fireman was James of London.

The Late Mrs. (Dr.) Hobbs.

The funeral of the late Mrs. (Dr.) Hobbs, of Toronto, who for nearly 30 years was a resident of this city, will take place this morning at 11:30 from the C. P. R. station to Woodland Cemetery. Deceased had for the last eight or nine years, and since the death of her husband, resided with a son in Toronto, at which place she died on Sunday. There are also left to mourn her loss two married daughters, one of them being Mrs. McAlpine, of Petrolia, and a son at present in the Northwest. Deceased's husband, the late Dr. Hobbs, was widely known, for a number of years having been physician at the Middlesex county jail, which position he occupied until a few years ago, when he resigned. Dr. Hobbs then took up his residence on Ridout street, and there practiced medicine until the time of his death.

The First Chinese Burial Here.

At 10 o'clock yesterday, at Ferguson's undertaking establishment, the funeral of Jung Kai Sam, a Chinese laundryman, took place. It was the first instance of a Chinese funeral in this city, and it was attended by all the Celestials of London. Deceased came to this country from Canton, China, eight months ago, leaving behind him a wife and three children, and took up his abode in London. A few days ago he was attacked with cerebral hemorrhage, which resulted in his death on Saturday. The services at the morgue and grave were conducted by Rev. J. A. Murray, deceased, along with his brethren, having been an adherent of St. Andrew's Church for some time. The services throughout were listened to with marked interest by those in attendance, the remains being interred under instructions from his friends. The grave at Mount Pleasant was marked, after their custom, with Chinese characters.

A Postoffice Employee Dead.

Mr. Robert McNeill, who for the past thirteen years has been connected with the postoffice department here, died rather suddenly Saturday afternoon. Blood poisoning commenced its insidious work upon his left arm many years ago, and about two years since amputation was found necessary. Since then Mr. McNeill had been slowly declining. On the 10th of this month he took to his bed. But his death was not expected so soon. Mr. McNeill was born at Armagh, Ireland, on March 15, 1845. He came to this city with the regiment over which Major Evans, who was a brother-in-law of Bishop Heliunth, had command. Severe his connection with military affairs, he entered the post-office service early in 1880 as a messenger in the inspector's office. Since January 1, 1887, he has been a letter collector. Mr. McNeill, who lost his wife about seven years ago, leaves three daughters and a son to mourn his loss.

Western Military Changes.

Twenty-eighth Perth Battalion, No. 4 Company, St. Mary's—Second Lieut. Frederick W. L. Long, having failed to qualify, his name is removed from the list of officers of the active militia.

Twenty-ninth Waterloo Battalion, Berlin—To Major William H. Cooper, vice, E. J. Beaumont, retired.

Thirty-second Bruce Battalion, No. 4 Company, Paisley—The announcement in G. O. 60, of Sept. 15, 1893, of the resignation of Capt. A. McGraw, is amended by permitting that officer to retire retaining rank.

Thirty-ninth Norfolk Battalion, No. 7 Company, Port Dover—Second Lieut. John A. McBride, having been reported as medically unfit for service, his name is removed from the list of officers of the active militia.

Ministerial Association's Annual Meeting.

The October meeting of the London Ministerial Association was held in the Y. M. C. A. rooms yesterday morning. The following members were present: Rev. Messrs. Clark, Gundy, Clement, Talling, Rigby and Annis. Rev. Thos. Cullen was elected a member of the association. The annual election of officers resulted in the choice of Rev. Jas. Smith as president, Rev. W. J. Clark as vice-president and Rev. Walter Rigby as secretary. Rev. Mr. Talling read a paper on Emerson's teaching which elicited brief comments from the members present. It was resolved to ask Dr. Ansell to read a paper at the next meeting, the subject to be made known in time to notify members. The president and secretary were appointed a committee to provide for a series of papers for the coming winter months.

Had Been There Often.

"Now, you know you're a vagrant," remarked the magistrate testily when Wm. Burris stood before him in the Police Court this morning. "No, sir, I know I'm not," was the firm response. "You have been before me seventeen times—seventeen times. How often have you been in the Central?" "Once." A remand was made until Thursday. Burris, so P. C. Gall, who made the arrest, asserts, was creating quite a furore in his house on Talbot street. The prisoner knocked all the interior decorations into a "cocked hat" and then turned his wife into the street. It was at this interesting juncture that the constable made the arrest. Thomas Mitchell, who said he was a sergeant-major at the Dufferin Military College in 1878, appeared in the dock in his shirt sleeves. He had been found in the possession of a military overcoat, supposed to belong to the Barrack. Crown Attorney Mage said that an inspection of the stock in that institution had not yet been made, and asked that a remand be granted for a week. This was done. "You entitled to a military overcoat, anyway," said Mitchell, as he resumed his seat. Harry Grant, the youth of the numerous firearms and dangerous dirk, was again remanded. Some information Mr. Mage said, had been secured which was at variance with the prisoner's story. A further investigation would be made in the meantime. Wm. Dundas, who was accused of stealing a cornet and several other articles, pleaded guilty. Sentence will be passed on Thursday. His previous character will be investigated.
