MOUNTAINS OF ICE

Blockade the Harbor of St. Johns, New
foundland.

St. Johns, Nfld., June 11.—An ice-
berg blockade of the harbor has great-
ly damaged vessels. Navigation along
the coast has been universally danger-
ous, owing to the prevalence in im-
mense numbers of icebergs exceeding
in number and size anything seen in
the past quarter of a century.
The Allan Line steamer Carthagena-
ian met the first berg 270 miles off
the coast and reported that the whole
ocean from that point inward was dot-
ted with them. Their presence has the
most detrimental effect on the safety
of the vessels being in dan-
ger.

TWO BROTHERS DROWNED.

Toronto, June 11.—News reached the
city this morning of the accidental
drowning of the two sons of Mrs. John
Morton, of Baldwin village, York
county. The lads, who were aged 10
and 8 years respectively, went bath-
ing in Heise's mill pond, and then
proceeded to amuse themselves floating
on logs. The younger, getting beyond
his depth, began to sink, and Malcolm,
his elder brother, fearlessly rushed to
his aid. Both were drowned before
help could reach them.

CROPS IN THE UNITED STATES.

Washington, D. C., June 11.—The
Government crop report places the
total winter wheat area at 22,794,000
acres; total spring area, 11,825,000 acres.
Since the May report the condition of
winter wheat has fallen 4.3 points, that
of June being 77.9 against 82.7 on
May 1. The condition of spring wheat
indicates a prosperous yield, the aver-
age for the country being 89.9 per cent.
The average for the year 1905 was
97.8. Oats, 88.5, against 84.3 on same
date in 1905. Rye, 82.2, against 85.7 last
June. Barley, 82 per cent.

SUICIDE OF A FARMER.

Uxbridge, Ont., June 11.—Alexander
Patterson, a farmer, who lived on lot
10, con. 7, Uxbridge township, com-
mitted suicide yesterday morning by
hanging. He was about as usual dur-
ing the morning, and walked over his
farm, inspecting fences and viewing
his crops, and after speaking with his
son, who was plowing, he went to the
barn and crawled in through a hole
and placed a board over it to prevent
anyone seeing him. Shortly after this
his son's wife went to the barn for
some potatoes for dinner, when she
was horrified to find her father-in-
law hanging from a beam, quite dead.
It is thought his mind must have been
affected.

W. C. T. U. REGULAR MEETING.

The regular monthly meeting of the
W. C. T. U. was held on Tuesday af-
ternoon in Somerset Hall. The hon-
orary president, Miss Grogan, took
charge of the opening devotional ex-
ercises. The hearing and considera-
tion of quarterly reports from super-
intendents of the departments was the
order of business for the day. Nineteen
different departments reported
active work. The Industrial School
and three branches of the same are now
closed for the summer months. The re-
ports of work done in the other de-
partments were of an interesting and
encouraging character, particularly in
the evangelical department. It was
decided to continue the work and
regular meetings of the union
throughout the summer. On June 23

Will be the Tupperite Candidate in
South Middlesex

Son of the Man Who Counted Out Mr. C.

S. Hyman—The "Farmer Boy" Cry.

Delaware, June 11.—The adjourned

convention for South Middlesex was

held here yesterday. The attendance

was not very large, many Conserva-

tives throughout the riding considering

that the Liberal majority being so

great it was better not to have a con-

test. But the city managers insisted

on forcing the campaign. The whole

thing was cut and dried in advance,

as already intimated in the "Adver-

tiser." Mr. H. B. Elliot, a London

lawyer, and son of Judge William El-

liot, who at the last election in the

city counted out Mr. C. S. Hyman, the

choice of the people, was nominated.

Addresses were given by Messrs. Mc-

Kellar and Gray, of London, Ontario,

of Delaware; Henry Fisher and Logan,

of Oneida. The fight will be a pecu-

liar one. Then a number of the Lib-

erals in the riding favored recently

the nomination of M. B. B. Osler, the

roiled jurist, the Conservative agents

throughout the riding. Immediately

started the cry that it would be a

dreary humiliation to the riding to

take a lawyer candidate and an out-

sider to represent them. Now, as a

fortiori hope, to prevent an election

by acclamation, these same men are

ready to champion the cause of a Lon-

don lawyer, who has hardly won his

spurs in the profession.

No doubt an effort will be made to

poll as large a vote for Mr. Elliot as

possible, though he is doomed to de-

feat. It will be for the friends of Mr.

McGugan, the Liberal candidate, to see

that every vote in his favor is polled.

The majority on this occasion should

be at least 800, and maybe 1,000, if

everyone goes to the polls, as is a

duty.
