Oil Companies Complain to the Rail-

DISCRIMINATION

way Committee Against the O. P. and G. T. Companies.

[Special to The Advertiser per C.P.R.] Ottawa, Ont., March 20.—The com-plaint of the Sun Oil Company and he Galt Schneider Oil Company against the G. T. R. and C. P. R. Companies, with regard to discrimination in freight rates, came up at the railway com-mittee of the privy council today. There were present at the committee Sir Henry Joly and Messrs. Blair, Mills and Dobell.

B. B. Osler and Mr. Bell represented the G. T. R.; Judge Clark, the C. P. R. Staunton, Hamilton & Brodeur, the

oil company. A charge of discrimination was laid already before the committee, the principal one being that in respect to the rates between Buffalo and Montreal on one hand, and Sarnia and Montreal on the other. The charge was that 35 cents was charged between Buffalo, Black Rock, Suspension Bridge and Montreal, and 25 cents from Sarnia to Montreal, although the distance in the

latter case was longer.
The G. T. R. admitted the rates and put in evidence to show that the reason of the low rate from Sarnia was on account of the water route which would supply competition. The company also admitted the meeting with representatives of the Standard Oil people in Montreal, when it was arranged that one-sixth of a reduction would be given on the 25 cents rate from Sarnia to Standard Oil people if they would not put on tank boats to run against them. Later on, the Can-adian Pacific, through Judge Clark, also admitted this meeting, after which rates from Detroit were increased and one-sixth reduction was to be given on the Sarnia rate for the same reason as mentioned by the G. T. R.
