DISCRIMINATION

Oil Companies Complain to the Railway Committee Against the O. P. and G. T. Companies.

Ottawa, Ont., March 20.—The complaints of the Sun Oil Company and the Galt-Schneider Oil Company against the G. T. R. and C. P. R. Companies, with regard to discrimination in freight rates, came up at the railway committee of the privy council today. There were present at the committee Sir Henry Joly and Messrs. Blair, Mills and Dobell.

B. B. Osler and Mr. Bell represented the G. T. R.; Judge Clark, the C. P. R.; Staunton, Hamilton & Broderick, the oil company. A charge of discrimination was laid already before the committee, the principal one being that in respect to the rates between Montreal and Montreal on one hand, and Sarnia and Montreal on the other. The charge was that 35 cents was charged between Buffalo, Black Rock, Suspension Bridge and Montreal, and 25 cents from Sarnia to Montreal, although the distance in the latter case was longer.

The G. T. R. admitted the rates and put in evidence to show that the reason of the low rate from Sarnia was on account of the water route which would supply competition. The company also admitted the meeting with representatives of the Standard Oil people in Montreal, when it was arranged that one-sixth of a reduction would be given on the 25 cents rate from Sarnia to Standard Oil people if they would not put on tank boats to run against them. Later on, the Canadian Pacific, through Judge Clark, also asked this meeting, after which the rates from Detroit were increased and one-sixth reduction was to be given on the Sarnia rate for the same reason as mentioned by the G. T. R.

And the Methodist Ministers Criticize Sheldon.

Chicago, March 21.—The Methodist ministers have added their voices to the outcry which is being made by the Chicago preachers against Mr. Sheldon and his edition of the Topeka Capital. At the weekly meeting Rev. W. A. Burch, of the South Park Avenue Church, denounced the actions of Mr. Sheldon as blasphemous, and that several other clergymen made strong speeches uncompromisingly to the preacher-editor, and it was only through the efforts of the chairman that the ministers deferred adopting resolutions condemning Mr. Sheldon and his paper.

What will become of Mr. Sheldon's 'Coin's Financial School'?"

ROYAL TEMPLARS

Dominion Councillor George Lees (Con.) Says Their First Duty is to Defeat the Government.

Hamilton, March 21.—The twelfth session of the Dominion Council, Royal Templars, opened in the court house here yesterday, George H. Lees, Dominion councillor, presiding, and there were representatives present from all the provinces.

The report of Dominion Councillor Lees (which strongly evidences the political animus of the council) showed that in 1888 and 1889 the order had experienced two successful progressive years. The report said that the vote on the plebiscite showed a substantial majority for prohibition; yet in the face of this the government violated the pledges and they ignored the will of the people. As regards the programme of the Dominion Alliance in seeking to pledge 100,000 voters, the Dominion councillor said their first duty was to oust the present government from power as a punishment. As to the financial condition of the order, reports show that bad management in the past had left a legacy of debt for the present management, which was being rapidly wiped off. The report favored increased assessments in the insurance department.

Dr. Emery, Dominion secretary, in his report, says the revenues are sufficient for all current needs, and leave a surplus. The beneficiary membership increased over 20 per cent during 1888-9, and the surplus was over \$51,000. General Manager A. M. Weather's report favored increased assessment, and submitted a table of rates for consideration. A number of members went to South Africa, and their insurance was continued at the old rates.

DEATH OF GEO. H. BERTRAM, M.P.

Toronto, March 21.—George H. Bertram, M.P. for Centre Toronto, died last evening after a long and painful illness. Mr. Bertram had known for some time that recovery from the cancerous growth with which he was afflicted, was impossible, and his physicians a few days ago announced that the end was near. He died, surrounded by the members of his family. He was 53 years old, and came to Canada from Scotland at the age of 18. In November, 1887, Mr. Bertram was elected as the Liberal representative in the House of Commons of Centre Toronto, over O. A. Howland. At the age of 23 Mr. Bertram married Christina Murray, of New Glasgow, Quebec. He leaves a family of five children, the eldest son, John Bertram, being in the wholesale hardware trade in Toronto. Two daughters are married and two younger sons are at college.
