

ONLY SIX COMPANIES HAVE

STARTED. A Pretoria dispatch of today's date says: The six companies of the Royal Canadian Regiment, now on their way home, their term of service having expired, form a minority of the command. Col. Otter, the commander of the regiment, with headquarters and a majority of the troops, remain here.

THE STRATHCONAS. Ottawa, Oct. 1.-Lieut.-Col. Steele, in command of Strathcona's Horse, sends a report to the minister of militia, under date of Aug. 16, from Troylefaar Camp. Pooley's troop drove out a party of Boers who had taken shelter in a donga. the 10th a squadron of the regiment, by order or Lord Dundonald, took possession of Evereels and established posts, the army arriving there the

The following Tuesday Lord Dundonald ordered a squadron to go forward and search the town of Carolina. This was done, Major Belcher being in command, and opposed by a considerable force firing behind stone walls, but he advanced in skirmishing order and drove the Boers out of the position and through the town. The place was held long enough to allow the provost marshal to complete the work of search. The contents of the magazine were blown up and two prisoners and a lot of ammunition taken. A lot of valuable information was secured from the inhabitants. The report shows the regiment to have had hard work and done splendidly. Col.
