ONTARIO CROPS

Estimate of the Yield for the Year 1900.

Grain Crops Quite Up to the Average - An Interesting Statement.

The Ontario department of agriculture has just completed the estimate of the yields of crops for 1900.

The most noticeable temperature feature has been the fact that the months of August, September and October were 5.4, 4.9 and 3.9 degrees, respectively, above the average.

On the whole the grain crops of the year were in quality and quantity quite up to the average. The new fall wheat crop is in fair condition, but the damage by Hessian fly is quite widespread.

Pessimistic View of the Far East Situation.

Looks as If the Powers Would Have to Climb Down—The Metropolis Afflicted With "Tubo Mania."

[Special Cable Letter.] London, Nov. 24.—The pessimism reflected by the Washington specialists dealing with China finds a keen echo in Great Britain's cabinet.

FAIR MOVEMENT. Toronto, Nov. 24.—Bradstreet's weekly summary of the business situation in Canada says:

Unfavorable weather at Toronto checked the demand for seasonal goods. Trade in that department of wholesale business has been disappointing so far this month.

At the Pacific coast business has suffered from mild weather, seasonal lines being slow. The lumber industry has been suffering over the scarcity of vessels for the ocean carrying trade.

Collins vs. Burwell—Judgment (E. B. B.) on appeal by plaintiffs for report of master at London on the grounds inter alia that no sufficient evidence was given of the investment of the sum of \$500 by the deceased, C. G. Anderson, one of the trustees named in the deed of settlement under which the plaintiffs are beneficiaries.
