TURF. LONDONER BUYS DEMOCRACY. Duncan Bell has bought for a Manitoba man, a half-mile track war-horse, Democracy, 3:07 1/2. By Happy Partner, for \$5,500, and the gray pacing stallion will probably do most of his racing on the Canadian tracks hereafter. Until last year Democracy was one of the hardest horses in the country to beat over the half-mile tracks. Then his old trainer, an Irishman named Cahill, died, and he was sold to a new owner, who has since beaten him the gray horse seemed to be easily beatable. The last season Cahill drove Democracy in 1906—he was so far gone with consumption that he was unable to lift him into the sulks, and then lift him out after the finish of a heat.
