Germany is a buyer of American products to the extent of \$250,000,000 annually, but the new tariff will give Russia, Austria and the Balkan countries a great advantage over the United States in the sale of foodstuffs in the German market.

It gives Canadians some satisfaction to see American producers, who have flouted foreign countries in the effort to monopolize the home market, beginning to realize that there is some limit to this selfish course. Germany has taught them one lesson, and Canada may teach them another. The United States may, if it chooses, take advantage of the German minimum tariff by entering into reciprocity arrangements, but more likely the tariff will be revised upon the basis of mininium and maximum duties. It is expected that a vigorous propaganda for this purpose will be launched as a result of the approaching conference. There has been a remarkable growth of reciprocity and tariff reform sentiment in the Eastern and Northwestern States during the past few years, but it has not been organized and has not been carried into politics, except in Massachusetts, where the Democratic candidate for governor won a notable victory on a reciprocity platform. The lucky farmers who have Manitoba wheat unsold will imposed on products from countries few in July, with the new crop only a month distant. It is said the present corner is the result of rivalry between large milling concerns, one of which has bought all the July wheat in sight with the object of squeezing the others. The chief sufferers are the small millers, who cannot afford to pay the market price for wheat, and the "shorts" who have contracted to deliver July wheat and are obliged to buy in order t) cover their obligations. As Monday is settling day, the rush of the shorts to cover may send the price soaring for a few hours, but those who have loaded themselves up with high-priced wheat may be equally anxious to unload, so that there may be no great disturbance. A U. S. Army Deserter Intends to Marry the President's Daughter.

New York, July 29. - The mysterious quest of a secret service detective sent by President Roosevelt to Governor's Island was explained yesterday, when Pte. James G. Jones, who has been serving a term of imprisonment in Castle Williams for desertion, was removed on a special order and examined by a board of lunacy.

Although great secrecy was maintained, it was learned that Jones had been sending tender love letters to Miss Alice Roosevelt from prison. He sent more than a score. In each of them he implored her to marry him, asserting that she could be happy with no one

The climax came when Jones sent a sharp note to Mrs. Roosevelt in which he said that she was standing between her step-daughter and himself. He declared that if Mrs. Roosevelt would only give her consent he would crown life of the President's laughter with the happiness she craved. The lunacy board took no action yesterday. Its members are as perplexed as Gen. Grant, and the detective were. Some or them think Jones is feigning insanity, and others say he shows no other symptom of an unbalanced mind than his conduct as regards Miss Roosevelt.

The case is so delicate that none but rusted officers have been permitted to learn the facts. The lunacy board is composed of men who have reputations for keeping their own counsel. Jones is smooth-faced and handsom His record in the army is none too good.

He was imprisoned for deserting once Jones refuses to say where he met or saw Miss Roosevelt, but declares that he did see her and that she recognized him with a smile. He says he will never forget that smile, and that he is convinced that she returns his love. He calls her "Alice" in speaking of

It is the opinion of those familiar with the case that ones saw Miss Roosevelt at some furction when the coast artillery acted as a military guard to the President. They do not doubt that Jones saw the President's daughter somewhere, and that the sight of her turned his head.

SNARES FOR EMIGRANTS

Many Thousands Fall Into Hands of Uascrupulous Sharks.

London, July 28 .- Over 60,000 people leave the country every year to settle abroad, but the number would be far in excess of this figure were all those who paid part of their passage money to fraudulent agents successful in emigrating. As a matter of fact, the emigrant swindle is a power in the land, though it is not often that he falls into the hands of the police, said an official at one of the emigrant offices.

The chief victims of the emigrant swindler are servants, butlers, exscidiers and the like, who are that if they emigrate to some remote corner in the earth they will make their fortunes in a few years. These swindlers usually work gangs, sending their decoys among those occupying the humbler walks of life in order to point out to them the advantages of emigration. The modus operandi is as follows: The decoy, finding his victim, gives him pamphlet which states at length that certain manufacturers in Mexico or Canada are in need of English employes, and will gladiy pay half the assage money of any reliable man or woman who is content to sign an dwelt upon hideously." agreement for five years' employbent at a salary which will be any hing between £2 and £6 per week. 




