HUNDREDS PERISH IN MEXICAN FLOODS

Monterey, Mexico, Sept. 10.—Word was received yesterday from Xicotencatl, in the State of Tamaulipas, that the entire country was inundated along the Tampico branch of the Mexican Central Railroad between the San Juan River and La Cruz. Several towns report loss of life ranging from a few up to 500 persons in some instances.

Below Xicotencatl all the plantations on the Tampico River were destroyed and several towns wiped out.

The destruction along the San Juan River was almost complete.

A relief train, left here with provisions and clothing.

All the irrigation works in and around Matamoros have been ruined and will involve a loss of millions of dollars.

The Tampico branch of the Mexican Central Railroad for several kilometres has completely disappeared between San Juan River and La Cruz.

LITTLE SICKNESS HERE

Medical Health Officer Says London Was Never Healthier.

The city is very healthy at the present time, and from indications there will be little or no typhoid fever this year.

Dr. Hutchinson, medical health officer, is authority for the statement that there is very little sickness in the city.

"There are few cases of contagious disease here at the present time," said Dr. Hutchinson. "There are one case of scarlet fever, and three cases of diphtheria in the isolation hospital. The smallpox patient was discharged some time ago, and there is none of that sickness now."

"I think there is but one case in London, and there is some doubt about that. Some threatened cases have been mentioned, but none have developed. I should think we would be quite free from it this season."

DEFEAT OF HIS PETS SMARTS CHUBBY CHARLIE

Murphy, of Cubs, Says Umpire Klem Conspired Against His Team.

Chicago, Sept. 10.—Charges that Umpire Klem deliberately acted as conspirator, robbing the Cubs of any reasonable chance of victory at Pittsburgh on Tuesday, were presented yesterday in a lengthy protest by President Murphy to President Heydler of the National League. Not only did he question the honesty of Klem, but summed up the methods which he alleges are in vogue when Klem presides at a game involving the Cubs. In his letter Murphy says: "Umpire Klem, whose ungovernable temper is known not only to all ball players, but even to most patrons of the National League parks as well, smarting under a cumulative grievance from the baseball season of 1908, deliberately weakened the Chicago club in what is generally regarded as the most crucial series of the season, so that Pittsburgh could win."

Because of Klem's alleged violation of the National League constitution, Murphy has entered formal protest against the game of last Tuesday being awarded to the Pittsburghers and insists that it be replay
