**Former Londoner is Named Secretary of Irish Auxiliary.**

Rev. J. G. Perdue, former curate of St. Paul's Cathedral, has been appointed to a most important post in the Anglican Church in Ireland. The Irish Times, Dublin, has the following to say of the appointment:

"The Rev. J. George Perdue, M.A., has been appointed secretary of the Irish auxiliary of the Colonial and Continental Church Society, in place of the Rev. Gordon J. Walsh, M.A., who has become rector of St. Peter's Parish, Athlone. Mr. Perdue was ordained for the curacy of Lisnaskea, County Fermanagh, and was afterwards for three years in charge of Trinity Parish, near Enniskillen. For the past four years he has been assistant minister at St. Paul's Cathedral, London, Canada, to the late Rev. A. G. Dann, rector and predecessor of the cathedral, whose sudden death has caused widespread sorrow, not only in Canada, but here at home. Mr. Perdue was one of the Dublin volunteers at the time of the Boer war, and spent some 18 months in South Africa on active service. His colonial experience should be of great value to his work for the Colonial and Continental Church Society, whose activities are mainly in connection with the homefolk who emigrate to the distant portions of Canada, Africa and Australia."

God's purpose is to make manhood and womanhood, but the purpose of our life is service. God's help is personal. It remains for each one of us to trust in the everlasting arms of divine strength.

**SARNIA MAN'S BODY FOUND 30 MILES AWAY**

**Recovery of James Mulligan's Remains—Sleeper on Track Run Over by Engine.**

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Sarnia, Aug. 29.—The body of the late James Mulligan, who was drowned at the chain works' dock on Friday night, Aug. 19, was found floating in the river near Algonac, about 30 miles south of here, on Sunday morning. The body was brought here and taken to deceased's late residence, Christina street south. The funeral will likely be held on Tuesday morning to the R. C. Cemetery. Coroner Dr. Logie summoned a jury which met this morning to inquire into cause of deceased's death.

The tug Sarnia City, of the Reid Wrecking Company, while towing a raft of 45,000 logs across the Georgian bay, ran aground on Saturday morning, which dashed the raft on the Duck Islands, causing it to break up. A number of the logs were driven ashore. Many of the logs will not be recovered, but the tug will tow the remainder of the raft to Sarnia.

The last chapter in the story of the tragic death of George Fralick was closed today, when the dismembered arm of deceased was found floating in the river near South Park, Port Huron. The arm was brought over to Sarnia, and will be buried alongside deceased's body in Lakeside cemetery.

**Council Meeting.**

The town council met as a court of revision on Friday evening. Several complaints of errors in measurements of sidewalk and overassessments were heard, and referred to the proper authorities for adjustment, and the court adjourned. At the special meeting of the council which followed, communications were read from S. E. Todd, of Petrolia, proposing the holding of a public meeting to discuss the question of advertising Lambton County. Referred to industrial committee. Owing to the numerous complaints that have been brought before the mayor relative to the speeding of automobiles in the south end of the town, his worship stated that at a recent meeting of the police committee it was decided that a special constable should be placed on duty in that part of the town for a couple of months. Reeve Milne said some action should be taken to keep the railings at the top of Cromwell and Lochiel street hills free from loafers, who congregate there so frequently. Mayor Johnston replied that the police have been doing their best to keep loafers away, but one crowd is no sooner dispersed than another crowd gathers. Petitions were received from residents on North street, Cameron and Forsythe streets, asking for granolithic sidewalks. The clerk reported them sufficiently signed, and the work will be proceeded with. A bylaw was passed appointing Chief Crawford an inspector under the act regulating the manufacture and sale of bread, after which council adjourned to meet on Sept. 12.

It is not thought that he will lose his foot.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Havers, whose death occurred on Friday morning, was held from her home on Talford street to Mooretown cemetery, yesterday. He was one son, Fred, of Port Huron, and one daughter, Mrs. John McGurk, of Sarnia.

**THEODORE ROOSEVELT WITH ROUGH RIDERS**

**He Says the Spirit of the West Is Still Alive—Does a Stunt Himself.**

Cheyenne, Wyoming, Aug. 28.—I'm here to see what you fellows can do on the hurricane deck of a broncho," Theodore Roosevelt said yesterday, as a group of cowboys, the hardest riders in the west, gathered about him, mounted on their horses. He saw all that the wild west of today had to show him in the way of deeds of skill and daring, and said that the spirit of the west was still alive.

As Mr. Roosevelt watched the cowboys at their work, heard the Indians yell, and saw the familiar sights of more than twenty years ago, when for a short time he was a plainsman, the spirit of it all came over him again, and he climbed down from the flag-draped reviewing stand and mounted a big white horse. He galloped about the half-mile track at Frontier Park and past the crowded grand stand, while the cowboys yelled, Indians gave their warwhoop and the rest of the crowd joined in a tremendous shout. He dismounted after one lap, smiling, and went back to his place to see the rest of the fun.

Every cowboy who had drawn a week's pay and could get here, came. There were a great many of them, and a number of cowgirls. They came on horseback from miles around, some of them hundreds of miles. The streets were thronged with men and women on horseback, in picturesque attire. There were a good many thousands of other persons, too, eastern tourists and the tradesmen and plain farmers of the region, but they got little attention. It was the day of the old wild west.

By the time Mr. Roosevelt arrived here, shortly after 9 o'clock, this celebration was under way. They met him at the station with a band and an escort of cavalrymen, but there was a parade.
