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BISHOP MILLS AGAINST AN OATH PROTEST

Kingston, June 16.—Bishop Mills today expressed the conviction that the Diocese of Ontario would show wisdom in leaving alone any proposed protest against changes in the coronation oath, and though several strong speeches were made in favor of a protest to King George and the British Government, the bishop's wish was acceded to and the motions withdrawn.

The synod will ask the general synod to seek to have Parliament unify the marriage laws, and have one law apply to all the Dominion, so that Roman Catholics cannot in case of mixed marriages, break the ties as has been done.

The synod concluded its work this afternoon.

A VERDICT FOR \$400 GIVEN THE PLAINTIFF

Keyser Against Schier Was Concluded at County Court Yesterday.

The jury returned a verdict of \$400 in favor of the plaintiff in the case of Keyser against Schier. The amount asked was \$500 for breach of contract in non-delivery of apples, for which, it is alleged an agreement had been entered into.

On July 29, 1909, Philip Keyser, an apple dealer, of Stratford, and Manfred Schier, an apple dealer, of Arden, entered into an agreement for the shipment from Theford by the defendant to the plaintiff of 1,000 barrels of apples at \$2 a barrel, to be paid for and inspected by the plaintiff before leaving the depot. On Oct. 18 the plaintiff demanded the apples, but the defendant refused. By reason of this the plaintiff claims that he was forced to buy apples at 50 cents a barrel more to fill contracts, thereby losing considerable money.

The defence claimed that the plaintiff failed to carry out the terms of the contract in not depositing \$500 to the defendant's credit, and that the plaintiff was not ready to inspect the apples or make payment on them at the time of shipment. The defendant entered a counter claim for \$500 for loss in having to resell.

Duncan C. Ross, of Ross & Bixell, of Stratford, appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. Johnston, McKay, Dods & Grant, of Toronto, for the defendant.

The matter was brought up at a meeting of St. George's Society last night, and talked over with representatives from the Sons of England, and it was unanimously decided to call the mass meeting.

The St. Thomas Englishmen meet this evening to discuss picnic arrangements, and an effort will be made to get them to come to London.

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LEADER BORDEN AT INGERSOLL

Chief Speaker at Oxford County Conservative Picnic.

ATTACKS GOVERNMENT

Refers to Quebec Bridge Collapse, Sawdust Wharf, and the Navy Question.

[By Our Own Reporter.] Ingersoll, June 16.—The Borden picnic here today was a quiet and altogether respectable affair.

Mr. Borden was at his best. He delivered a good Borden speech on the record of the Laurier Government. The piece de resistance in today's offering was on the celebrated sawdust wharf, which was the breakfast food of South Oxford Conservatives, served in real hot sauce. This was heralded as the big part of the day's proceedings just as the Quebec bridge was the feature of the Campbellford meeting, and the naval question the strong food for the Toronto Conservatives. However, it did not line up to expectations, as it has been taken up scores of times. Mr. Borden spoke at some length, and was given a good hearing. There was a unanimity about the gathering that made it very plain that there were no disturbing elements present. At no time was there much enthusiasm, but the remarks of the speakers were listened to attentively.

The New Lieutenant. Quite the feature of the day, outside of Mr. Borden's appearance, was the presence of ex-Judge Doherty, of Montreal, Mr. Borden's new lieutenant. Mr. Doherty delivered a scholarly speech dealing with the alleged failure of the Government to make a thorough house-cleaning following the civil service commission, and with the expenditures on the construction of the Transcontinental Railway. He has a good flow of language, is possessed of a strongly judicial mind, and considerable wit. While not yet accustomed to picnic oratory, Mr. Doherty delivered a good strong speech, one which would have been heard to better advantage in a hall or rink. He introduced as the "wittiest French-Irishman in the Dominion," a reputation that is apparently somewhat heavy to bear.

Speeches were also made by Hon. Dr. Reame, Dr. Coleridge (Ingersoll), Geo. Sinclair (Ingersoll), and others. A civic welcome was extended to Mr. R. L. Borden by Mayor Mackay, on behalf of the citizens.

Parade to the Park. Mr. Borden, accompanied by ex-Judge Doherty, Organizer Carstairs, and others, reached Ingersoll shortly before noon, and were met by Dr. Coleridge and a deputation of local Conservatives. He attended for a brief space the annual meeting of the South Oxford Conservative Association, and was afterwards entertained at lunch. At 1:30 preparations were made for the parade to the park.

At 2 o'clock the procession moved, with the Citizens' Band leading, Mr. Borden and a number of leading Conservatives in carriages were taken to Victoria Park, where the exercises were held. On arriving there a somewhat disappointing audience greeted the Conservative leader. The attendance was not more than 500, and of these a considerable number came from Woodstock and outside places.

Bouquets and Kisses. Mr. George Naylor, president of the association, presided. On taking the platform Mr. Borden and Mr. Doherty were presented with fine bouquets by three dainty little tots named Ruth Tooten, Essie Sutherland and Mildred Gregg. They were suitably rewarded.

Mr. Naylor introduced the celebrities to the audience. He then extolled the glories of Ingersoll, referring to the ten miles of sidewalk, and the fine maple trees of the town. Reference was also made to the new hospital.

Addresses of Welcome. Addresses of welcome were read to Dr. Borden by Dr. Coleridge, James Sinclair, and Dr. Mackay, mayor of Ingersoll. All expressed pleasure at welcoming the distinguished visitors.

Mr. Borden responded in a happy mood to the addresses of welcome, and expressed his pleasure at the presence of so many ladies. When the Conservative party won the sympathy of the ladies the day was won, he declared.

Entering seriously into his subject, he stated that it was not his intention of criticising the rank and file of Liberalism, as they were just as honest, just as patriotic, just as sincere as the Conservatives; but he was going to criticise the men who were leading, or rather misleading, the party, as he put them. They had departed from the high ideals of Hon. Alex. Mackenzie and earlier Liberal leaders, and had disgraced the great party by the mismanagement and bad government. He confessed that he had hoped to carry the country at the last general election. The Conservatives had had a good policy, and a good platform. However, by the use of the power in the Government's hands they had been defeated. There was this coming, however, that since the election the Government had, in whole or in part, adopted four planks of their platform, chief among which was civil service reform.

The citizens, however, had the right to expect that the Government of the country should be carried on honestly—that it was not the intention of the electors of the country that the Government should make millions, or provide funds for party victories. The Liberals had not kept their promises of honest administration, he claimed. He referred to the Imperial Realty Company, Ottawa, from whom the Government rented offices. The sum of \$9,000 was paid to this company for lighting, when the city of Ottawa could light it for \$5,000; a clear steal of \$4,000 a year, declared Mr. Borden.

The Sawdust Wharf. The sawdust wharf was then dealt

with, and Mr. Borden recited the incidents of the purchase of this property.

This sounds like comic opera," said Mr. Borden, when there was the suspicion of a smile among the audience, "but it is a serious business. The Government paid \$5,000 for a wharf that was refused at \$200, and which has never been used. The money was turned over to party heeled, and no value whatever was received. The transaction was so flagrant that the public account committee, Liberal and Conservative alike, roundly condemned the deal. It was not Laurier's money nor Pugsley's money that was spent, but the electors' money. They had the right to at least common honesty in the administration of affairs."

These questions were small, of course, but they were more readily understood than the larger matters continued Mr. Borden. The Quebec bridge was an example of the latter. He declared that \$6,000,000 of Canadian money was lying at the bottom of the River St. Lawrence, a silent testimonial to the incompetence and negligence of the Government. They had erred in not providing competent engineers, and also in awarding the tender to firms of ordinary standing.

The Naval Question. The naval question was touched upon at some length. The type of vessel purchased by the Government was not effective, he declared, and sized up badly beside the Dreadnoughts of Australia and New Zealand. The question of effective and immediate aid had not been settled as yet. It should have been before this large expenditure was gone on with.

"If Canada is of the empire in peace, she must be of the empire in war," declared the speaker. "We must either haul down the flag on our ships in time of war, or fly the flag of neutrality, if the war does not meet with the Government's ideas of it. That, I say, is wrong. We are with the empire in peace; we must be with the empire in war."

The people of Canada, he declared, would not support a policy that would divide the navies of the empire. The empire at present was a vast disorganization. It was not organized for defence. It was not organized for trade. One of the problems for imperial statesmen was that of so welding the parts that it would be organized in peace and war, in prosperity and in calamity, in trade and commerce.

Mr. Borden, in his concluding remarks dealt with the necessity for higher citizenship, and careful consideration of the great public questions.

Government as a Spender. Ex-Judge Doherty, M. P., St. Anne's, followed. He dealt largely with the Montreal, followed. He dealt largely with the investigation of the spending departments of the Government.

"I asked for the appointment of a commission to inquire into these departments," declared ex-Judge Doherty. "The condition of affairs had been characterized by the term, 'Augean stables,' and I asked the Government to clean them out. Did they do it? All the answer I got was, 'To the pure all things are pure.' Why did the Government not go and do the work? Why did they not clean out the departments and make them pure and clean, as they should be?"

The great expenditure on the Transcontinental was another source of worry to Mr. Doherty, and he declared that the Government deliberately refused to give the Opposition any information regarding these expenditures.
