HONORABLE S. C. BIGGS TAKEN BY DEATH

Prominent Lawyer and Public Man Succumbs to Long Illness.

Toronto, Sept. 28.—After an illness extending over a year, Hon. S. C. Biggs, K.C., died at the residence of his son, Mr. Richard A. Biggs, 1711 Bloor street, at noon yesterday.

Mr. Biggs suffered from a general breakdown of the system, brought about by too close application to business. For over a year he had been unable to move about and was practically confined to his room. During the summer the family had been removed to the country in the hope that he would benefit by the change. He was brought to the city about three weeks ago, at which time hope of his recovery was practically abandoned.

Hon. S. C. Biggs had long been a striking figure in Toronto and Ontario. He had considerable platform work in the Liberal interests in several campaigns. He was an eloquent advocate of the temperance cause and prominently identified with the alliance and kindred organizations for the promotion of prohibition. He was a man of the legal attainments and had a high standing at the bar.

Sketch of His Career.

Hon. S. C. Biggs was born at Ancaster, Ont., on Oct. 8, 1851, being the eldest son of the late Richard Biggs. He was educated at Ancaster, Toronto, Victoria College, Cobourg, and the University of Toronto, where he graduated as B. A. in 1872, being silver medalist in natural sciences. Mr. Biggs studied law with Mr. Charles Moss, of the firm of Hartison, Osler & Moss, now chief justice of the court of appeal.

Mr. Biggs removed to Winnipeg, Manitoba, in 1875, where he was admitted to the Manitoba bar and commenced the practice of his profession. He was a member of the Legislature for St. Paul's, Manitoba, and minister of public works in the Northwest Government. He incorporated the Law Society of Manitoba in 1877, with Dr. Bryce, the Bishop of Ru-

per's Land, and Hon. J. Ryal, he founded the University of Manitoba, the first being drawn up in Mr. Biggs' residence in Winnipeg.

In 1888 Mr. Biggs removed to St. Paul, Minn., where he was engaged in the practice of law and identified with several large enterprises. He settled in Toronto in 1892, forming the law firm of Biggs & Pettie. He continued in practice with his sons until his health broke down.

Mr. Biggs was married to Emily Orythia, daughter of the Rev. Thomas Atkinson. The widow and three sons, St. Percy and Richard A., barristers, and Dr. G. M. Biggs, all of Toronto, survive.

PARIS AUTO-BUS SHOT INTO SEINE

Eleven Persons Killed in an Accident at French Capital.

FINE RESCUE BY PRIEST

Escapes From Vehicle at River Bottom and Saves Six.

Paris, Sept. 28.—Eleven persons were drowned and three others injured by the overturning of an auto-bus into the Seine yesterday afternoon. The accident occurred about 4:30 o'clock, the busiest time of the day. The bus, with 25 passengers, was coming from the Jardin des Plantes in the direction of the opera. It was half-way over the Pont de l'Archeveche, leading from the bank of the river to the island immediately behind the Cathedral of Notre Dame.

In trying to avoid a collision with another omnibus coming in the opposite direction, the chauffeur raised his steering wheel a sharp turn. The heavy vehicle, skidded violently, shot over the side of the bridge, crashed through the heavy iron railing and fell into the river below. All the passengers were carried down, with the exception of two or three, who, standing on the rear platform, realized their danger and jumped in the nick of time.

One of the passengers, a priest named Richard, who managed to escape from the watery prison on the river bank, saved six persons. He says all the passengers of the accident were found floating in the bottom of the river groping around.

Finally he found a window through which he managed to swim to the surface. He climbed to the top of the omnibus and immediately turned his attention to the other passengers who were in difficulties, pulling them from the roof behind him, from which uncertain refuge they were hauled off by the dremen.

PERJURY CHARGES HEARD AT CHATHAM

One Dismissed, and Decision Was Reserved in the Other.

Deceased was a son of William McLeister.

Coroner Dr. Hayes had a jury summoned late in the afternoon, and after viewing the body, an adjournment was made until Monday evening next.

Deceased leaves to mourn his loss his father and mother, two brothers, John and Walter, of Calgary, Alta., and two sisters, Mrs. J. Fulford, Point Edward, and Miss Robina McLeister, of Kansas.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

LITTLE ESSEX BOY VERY BADLY BURNED

WINDSOR CASE IS IN TORONTO COURTS

Arguments in Appeal Will Be Heard by Judge Today.

FALL DOWN CELLAR RESULTS FATAL

Mrs. Fred Goodman, of Dashedwood, Dies From Fractured Skull.

Exeter, Sept. 27.—Mrs. Goodman, wife of Mr. Fred Goodman, of Dashedwood, is dead, as a result of having fallen downstairs at her home. Mrs. Goodman was 80 years of age, and while her husband was away at work yesterday, missed her footing while descending from the cellar, and falling backward, landed on her head, fracturing her skull. Nothing was known of the accident until Mr. Goodman, coming home from work, at 10 o'clock, went to look for his wife, and was horrified to find her lying in the cellar. She regained consciousness for a short time before her death, and was able to tell how the accident occurred. Mrs. Goodman had been invalid for some time, and it is thought that the accident occurred as a result of this, as she was not used to moving about much.

Mr. Goodman, it is stated, was one of those who suffered in the Farmers' fund, and after having deposited all his savings in the institution, found himself at the age of 78, through the bank breaking, under the necessity of having to go out to work. He has been employed as a laborer.

FAREWELL WORDS OF EARL GREY

Defers Departure to Facilitate Change of Government.

SAYS HE WILL REVISIT

Premier and Premier-Elect Deliver Addresses.

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—Three hundred guests attended the Canadian Club's farewell dinner to Earl Grey last evening. During the course of his speech His Excellency stated that he had postponed his departure till Oct. 12, and it is generally understood that the actual change of Government in Canada will not occur until next week.

Much enthusiasm was aroused by Earl Grey's announcement that he intended to visit Canada, and thus break the unwritten rule which has prevented former governors from revisiting the Dominion after their term of service. He declared himself to be a whole-hearted imperialist, but one who had never overstepped the constitutional limits of his office.

Speeches eulogistic of His Excellency were delivered by Mr. R. L. Borden, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and Sir Charles Fitzpatrick.

Speeches around the banquetting board, in addition to the two first citizens of Canada, the Premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and the Premier-elect, Mr. R. L. Borden, were ministers, consular-general of foreign countries, and three hundred of the elite of the capital's most prominent citizens.

A Notable Event.

In more ways than one was the dinner a notable one. Reference to the battle of ballots was made half in a jest and half in earnest by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who made passing reference and told Sir Wilfrid that he hoped in Opposition he would live up to the attitude he had always endeavored to instill into the Conservative Opposition.

Both the leaders were loudly acclaimed by the distinguished gathering, and Sir Wilfrid evidently made a responsive note when he stated that he had planned big for the opening of the Transcontinental Railway, and hoped that Mr. Borden would assist Earl Grey to participate in the celebrations.

Reference in eulogistic terms to the colony of Newfoundland was also made by Earl Grey, who urged Canada, to try and get better acquainted with the lovely people of this, the oldest colony of the Empire. While some advice was given by the guest of honor to Canadians regarding the betterment of their institutions and the upbuilding of the future of the country, the development of the natural resources, and the bringing of the whole to be a greater factor in the Empire.

ST. THOMAS TO HAVE BIG NEW ROUNDHOUSE

Michigan Central Will Spend Fifty Thousand Dollars on Buildings.

A WILD SESSION ON NEW YORK EXCHANGE

Battle To Sell U. S. Steel a "Rough and Tumble."

New York, Sept. 27.—After the first wild rush to buy stocks on the Stock Exchange today it became apparent that heavy selling was again in evidence. The market again broke all through the afternoon it was attacked repeatedly by waves of selling, and the price of U. S. Steel fell from three to five points in the early trading. Veteran traders said that they never had witnessed such scenes as those on the floor of the Exchange.

Long before the opening the brokers began to gather about the post at which U. S. Steel is traded, ready to execute the buying orders which had been placed in as far as the Steel Corporation's statement. At the hour for opening of trading drew near the crash became greater. The stockholders were packed so closely that it was difficult for any one to raise an arm above his head.

The gong which signalled the opening of the market was a long, loud, and the men surged and swayed about the post, and then moved in a struggling mass across the floor. The stronger element composed of the sellers, who had gathered on one side of the crowd, forced the entire group across the floor. The brokers dragged each other across the floor, and the crowd was packed so closely that it was difficult for any one to raise an arm above his head.
