

1.000 Wanted for the Navy.

[Canadian Press.] 9 65 9 77 9 65 9 70 9 62 St. Johns, Nild., Dec. 3.—Enlistment for the second contingent to be sent by Newfoundland to join the British army s proceeding rapidly, together with that for the naval reserve. It is planned to double the present force to 540 men from the colony with the army in England. Under the present wintry conditions it has been found impracticable to gather the recruits into a camp, but arrangements have been made for drill every evening.
