Rome, via Paris, May 4 .- "In view of the international situation, the King and his ministers cannot leave the capital to be present at the unveiling of the Garibaldi monument at Quarto Sant Elena," was the text of a note issued after the meeting of the cabinet yesterday. Its publication produced a profound effect upon public opinion.

ticipation of King Victor Emmanuel and high Government officials in the ceremonies attendant upon the unveiling is believed to have been the result of the call made by Prince Von Buelow, the German ambassador, upon Foreign Min ister Sonnino Sunday night.
