BRITISH HAVE OVERCOME ALL HANDICAPS EXISTING AT FIRST

In Numbers and Equipment They Now Are Fully Equal To the Opposing Forces—Morale of the Troops is Growing Better All the Time.

LONDON, April 29.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The British army in France has increased immensely both in numbers and in perfection of equipment, according to a general review of the situation, written by an "eye witness" attached to headquarters in France. After recognizing the comparatively unimportant operations which followed those described in his report published April 29, the "eye witness" says:

"Though we have by no means been inactive, as the fighting on the 17th and 18th shows, comparative quiet has now prevailed on the front for a considerable time period, and the moment is, therefore, opportune for a survey of our general condition. Firstly, as regards the material side of the situation, it is a matter of common knowledge that our army in France has increased immensely, both in numbers and in perfection of equipment and armament. The fruits of this improvement are now beginning to be seen."

Have Advantage Now. "The reports from all parts show that we are now generally in no way inferior and in many places superior, to the enemy in the very form of warfare for which we were originally least prepared, that is, in siege operations, which imply mining, sharpshooting, and the throwing of explosives at short range. In this the Germans have until recently enjoyed a great advantage, for they had ready to hand the necessary troops, such as numerous units trained in mining, the handling of high explosives, and searchlight work, and special bodies of sharpshooters provided with rifles having telescopic sights."

They had ready, also, all the technical equipment, such as minenwerfer and various ballistic engines, throwing every kind of missile, electric and other light projectors, rockets, incendiary shells and pumps for spouting, blazing oil or pitch, which were the outcome of careful and elaborate experiments made in peace in anticipation of the war for which they have for years been making ready. Means of disseminating poisonous gases are apparently in the hands of the Germans, since the commencement of hostilities, since the use of these gases.

Snipers Gain Ascendancy. "But even with the aid of these advantages they have failed to crush the British, and the great factor of time has been on the side of the latter. This applies especially to us, and in spite of our initial handicaps, we are now in many ways beating the Germans at their own game. At some points we have obtained the mastery in sniping to such an extent that our men are able to walk about in their trenches in comparative safety, even within short range of the hostile line; and generally we are now in a position to harass the Germans and give them as little rest as possible by means of shelling, bomb-throwing or sniping."

"As regards the moral side, a consciousness of the general increase in power, and the feeling that we are growing stronger every day while the Germans are becoming weaker, is the chief factor responsible for the undoubtedly excellent state of the spirit of our forces, which is even better than it has ever been. The confidence of the fight at Neuve Chapelle, again, as has been pointed out, had a most encouraging effect on the troops, who are now fighting with confidence as to the accomplishment of the task ahead of us, however formidable it may be. The beneficial influence of this offensive action has been shown indirectly by a fact which would at first sight seem to be totally unconnected with it—an immediate and marked drop in the sick rate took place after the battle, which is only attributable to the success gained."

Good News Helps. "Among other things contributing to the general cheerfulness, also, is the good news which is continually received of the progress of our allies and the improvement in the weather. The cumulative effect of all this has been to inspire our men with a sense of superiority over the enemy. They are animated with confidence and are not without reason. There are also minor and less obvious factors, beyond the general sense of growing strength and the consciousness of efficiency derived from local successes, which have assisted towards building up the condition of a healthy mind in a healthy body, which is so marked in the British troops at the present stage of the campaign. Every advantage has been taken of adroitly chosen aids to counteract the depressing influence of the monotony and hardship of the trench warfare, through the long-drawn winter, and to ameliorate the results of the continuous strain to which all ranks have been subjected."

Amusements Provided. "Of these perhaps the provision of the bathing establishments and rest depots already described has been the most important. But the immense value of any sort of entertainment which can change the current of thought and divert the men's minds even temporarily from their immediate wretched surroundings has played an important part. To this end concerts, cinematograph shows, variety entertainments, boxing and football matches have been organized under circumstances have allowed. The psychological value of music, to which allusion has already been made, is no new thing. Its effects can be well witnessed at some of the villages behind our front line, where regimental bands perform, to the delight of the inhabitants as well as the soldiers; and also on the roads, where the pipes of certain Scotch territorial units, the penny whistle and the mouth organ instil fresh life into the tired legs. Some thousands of the whistles and mouth organs now have reached the front and been distributed."

A Different Scene. "Nothing could produce stronger contrast to this comparative inaction than the nature of the fighting in progress along the sand dunes farther to the north. Here a desperate struggle at short range continues from day to day, the opposing trenches being situated within a few yards of one another. Here, instead of mud and

VON BUELOW HAS NEW PROPOSALS

This Information Allowed To Be Published By Italian Authorities.

KING TO MISS UNVEILING

Change of Plans Believed To Be Result of German's Call.

[Canadian Press.]

Rome, via Paris, May 4.—"In view of the international situation, the King and his ministers will not leave the capital to be present at the unveiling of the Garibaldi monument at Quarto San Elena," was the text of a note issued after the meeting of the cabinet yesterday. Its publication produced a profound effect upon public opinion. Abandonment of the plan for the participation of King Victor Emmanuel and high Government officials in the ceremonies attendant upon the unveiling is believed to have been the result of the call made by Prince Von Buelow, the German ambassador, upon Foreign Minister Sonnino Sunday night. The details of this conference are supposed to have been presented at the meeting of the cabinet, the call for which was not issued until yesterday morning.

All Present. The ministers assembled two hours later, and the council lasted four hours. All the ministers arrived promptly at 11 o'clock except Minister of Justice Orlando, who was absent from Rome, and he returned to the city in time to take part in some of the deliberations. Immediately after the council closed Baron Sonnino, who had called upon the King before the session opened, went to the consulate, where the first secretary of the German embassy awaited him. After receiving a verbal communication from the baron, the secretary hastened to the Villa Malta, the private residence of Prince Von Buelow, while Foreign Minister Sonnino called upon the King for a second time.

No Comment Allowed. These events are interpreted in many ways in political circles, but the censors have forbidden the transmission of all comment. Correspondents are permitted to say, however, that Prince Von Buelow made new proposals Sunday night to Baron Sonnino. These proposals were submitted to the cabinet ministers, who will hold another council today. The press is unanimous in its opinion that the King's trip to Quarto has in no way altered the Government's decisions. A semi-official note couched in vague general terms, but which was understood to undergo any change from the King's not going to Quarto."

King's Promise. It is recalled that when committees arranged for the dedication of the monument called upon his majesty to invite him to be present at the ceremonies, he answered: "I shall go if reasons of state do not prevent me."

An official of the foreign office is reported to have stated that the Government's decision was due entirely to the situation in Tripoli, where "Italy might be forced to extreme measures to protect our colony where German agents are fomenting rebellion."

THOUGHT SIGNIFICANT. Rome, May 4.—The decision of King Victor Emmanuel and the members of the ministry just now, in view of the situation in Tripoli, where "Italy might be forced to extreme measures to protect our colony where German agents are fomenting rebellion."

The presence of his majesty at the unveiling had come to be regarded as virtually tantamount to a declaration of war. Now the change in the King's plans is regarded as meaning that the participation of Italy in the European war again has been postponed.

The hope is being entertained by the pacifists that the efforts of Italy to arrange a peaceful solution of her problems may ultimately be successful.

GERMAN OFFENSIVE LONG EXPECTED

The Daily Mail Correspondent Thinks Stories of Big Victory Exaggerated.

[Canadian Press.] London, May 4.—German claims of a crushing defeat of the Russian centre are exaggerated accounts of local successes in the opinion of the Daily Mail's military correspondent, who says: "Such exaggerated claims are to be expected just now, in view of the necessity of influencing wavering neutrals. Nevertheless the German offensive against the Russian centre long has been expected. For the past month the Germans have been moving men to Cracow."

"That such a manoeuvre as piercing the Russian centre was envisaged at the very beginning of the war, and that the Russian front has been pierced and a serious reverse suffered the war will be greatly prolonged, but that any German success, however great, will affect the resistance of Russia cannot be believed."

FOLLOW BRITISH LEAD

Germany Will Treat Officers as British Treats Submarine Prisoners.

[Canadian Press.] London, May 4.—A British official announcement issued today says Germany is arranging, through the United States ambassador, to accord exactly similar treatment to the British officers who are being held in German submarines as that given by Great Britain to German submarine prisoners.

GERMANY ADMITS LOSS OF PATROLS

Issues Report of Sinking of British Destroyer Recruit.

[Canadian Press.] Berlin, May 4.—By Wireless to Sayville.—The German admiralty has issued an announcement setting forth that on May 1, at noon, a German submarine sank the British torpedo-boat destroyer Recruit in the neighborhood of the Galopier light.

On the same day near the North Hinder lights there was an engagement between two German patrol boats and several armed British steam trawlers. One trawler was destroyed. A division of British destroyers thereupon entered the action, and the German patrol boats were lost. The British admiralty declares that a majority of the crew was saved.

WASHINGTON READY TO SERVE ITALY

Believes Intervention Will Be Announced in a Few Days.

[Canadian Press.] WASHINGTON, May 3.—Such advice as have come to the United States Government through official and unofficial channels within the last few days indicate that Italy's preparations clearly tend to her participation in the war at an early date.

As a result of this warning Italian diplomats in Europe, some of whom are in touch with the Italian situation, believe the decision is now only a matter of days, and are accordingly making plans to accommodate Italian interests should the emergency arise. If Italy should enter the war, it is understood she would ask the United States to send troops to Berlin and Constantinople to care for her diplomatic interests.

Italians Leave Austria. UDINE, Italy, May 3.—Italian consuls in Austria-Hungary are recommending that all Italians leave the country as soon as possible.

As a result of this warning Italian merchants, manufacturers and professional men are arriving today at Udine from points in Austria and Hungary. They relate experiences, including insults and persecutions, which are arousing the local feeling. The refugees describe the great military activity along the frontier.

It is impossible to traverse the frontier unless one is provided with a complete set of papers and establishes one's identity. All Italians still in Austria and Hungary are being closely watched by the local police.

Situation Is Critical. PARIS, May 3.—5:10 p.m.—A Rome dispatch to the Havas Agency says that the Italian cabinet today issued a decree placing Tripoli under martial law, owing to the attack on Italian troops by rebels near Syria last week.

The ministers also considered the international political situation, and decided that, in view of present conditions affecting Italy, no member of the cabinet should leave Rome.

TRIPOLI (via Paris), May 3.—11:30 p.m.—The losses of the Italian command by Col. Miami, who were attacked by a rebel band south of Syria on April 29, and were forced to retreat owing to the desertion of irregulars to the rebels, were eighteen officers and two hundred men killed or missing. Four hundred men wounded in the engagement have been placed on a steamer and sent to Syracuse.

PORT ARTHUR ELEVATOR DESTROYED BY FIRE

PORT ARTHUR, May 3.—The National Elevator Company, of Winnipeg, located on the Canadian Northern Railway tracks, was completely destroyed by fire at 10 o'clock tonight. The elevator had a capacity of about 500,000 bushels and was holding only a small amount at the time of the fire. The plant was worth about \$100,000, and insured for about \$60,000.

ZEPPELINES TO POLA. Rome, via Paris, May 4.—The Italian Nationalist Correspondent, a correspondent, says Germany has sent two Zeppelins to Pola, the Austrian arsenal on the Adriatic.

GODERICH INQUEST RESUMES TOMORROW

Postmortem Examination Report Presented to Coroner.

GODERICH, May 3.—Coroner A. C. Hunter's session of the inquest into the death of Robert Bean, whose murdered body was found on a road north of here, was short today. Only the evidence of the doctors performing the autopsy was taken, and adjournment was made until Wednesday at 2 p.m. The report of Doctors Galloway and Emerson showed that death had resulted from gunshot wound received in the back.
