MYSTERY IS SOLVED.

Two Russian Poles Arrested For Murder in Toronto.

TORONTO, Jan. 2.—The murder mystery of Mount Pleasant Cemetery has apparently been cleared up. The dead Macedonian who was found with crushed skull half covered in snow, near the old Belt Line tracks, late Tuesday night, has been identified as Bogdan Trendo, 24, laborer, married, 131 Niagara street. Under arrest are two Russian Poles: John Ziolkow, 23, 692 West Richmond street, and Thomas Seichocki, 21, 111 Elizabeth street. They will face a charge of murder in the police court this morning. The former is rumored to have made a statement tantamount to a confession, in which he admits having induced the victim to go out with him and Seichocki, having seen Seichocki striking the blows that killed Trendo, and having helped hide the body.

The alleged theft of a shovel, and Ziolkow's dismissal, the alleged tating of Trendo and rumors of the size of his savings—which had accumulated in order to bring his bride from his home in Zeglova, Macedonia—are said to have been the beginnings of the affair.

CANADIANS KNIGHTED

Six Are Thus Honored in King's New Year's List

They Are Sir George Perley, Sir Clifford Sifton, Sir Herbert Holt, Sir Francis Lemieux, Sir William Price and Sir Oliver Phillips-Wolley.

—Honor—No New Peers.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—The Canadians named in the King's New Year's honors list and the titles they now hold are:

Baronetcy.—Sir Hamar Greenwood, M.P. for Sunderland, Eng.

Knight of St. Michael and St. George.—Sir George Perley, Canadian acting High Commissioner in London; Sir Clifford Sifton, K.C.

Knight Bachelor.—Sir Herbert Holt, president of the Royal Bank, Montreal; Sir Francis Lemieux, acting Chief Justice of Superior Court of Quebec; Sir William Price, Quebec City; Capt. Sir Oliver Phillips-Wolley, Victoria, B.C.

Companion St. Michael and St. George.—George G. J. Desbarats, Deputy Minister of Marine, Ottawa; Surgeon Maj.-Gen. Eugene Fliset, D.S.O., Deputy Minister of Militia, Ottawa.

The King's New Year's honor list contains no new peers. The Earl of Aberdeen, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and formerly Governor-General

of Canada, is raised to the rank of marquess, and Viscount St. Aldwyn (Michael Hicks-Beach) is elevated to an earldom.

The Order of the Garter is conferred on the Earl of Derby and the Earl of Chesterfield, while the Order of the Thistle is bestowed on Baron Ker, for their services in recruiting.

Arthur Henderson, Labor leader and member of Parliament for the Barnard Castle division of Durham, is appointed a Privy Councillor. Sixteen persons receive the honor of knighthood. Among those knighted are Henry John Newbolt, barrister and author; Frank Watson Dyson, astronomer-royal since 1910; Dr. J. J. Dobbie, chemist; William Chander, judge of Assistant Court of Appeal, Barbados; Robert Johnston, lately Chief Justice of Grenada, and Wilfred Collet, Governor of British Honduras, and George Smith, Governor of the Windward Islands.

VON BUELOW FAILS.

His Mission To Rome To Influence Italy Proves Useless.

PARIS, Jan. 2.—According to a special correspondent of The Temps, who has just returned from Italy, Count von Buelow's mission at Rome has failed. "It is untrue," says The Temps, "that von Buelow offered Italy any concrete compensation for intervention in Germany's favor, or at least, disarmed neutrality. He only made vague promises to induce the Italian Government to show a less friendly attitude to Britain, as 'Britain is the sole enemy of Germany.' His mission was principally to convince Italy that her interests should be with Germany, as once Britain was expelled from the Mediterranean Italy might become a large Empire."

The Temps adds that the Kaiser sent von Buelow to Italy charged with such a difficult mission with only a vague hope of success. The Emperor's idea was to exploit von Buelow's popularity in Rome in case it might lead to the actual benefit of Germany, or, should he fail, to let von Buelow bear the whole responsibility.

Berlin Claims Success.

BERLIN, Jan. 2.—(Via London.) An unofficial report from the Wolff Agency reads as follows:

"We learn from a main headquarters that the war booty taken by our troops fighting in the Argonne in the month of December amounts altogether to 2,950 prisoners, 21 machine guns, 14 mine-throwers and one bronze mortar."

Forty Million for France.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—It is announced that arrangements have been concluded to issue publicly on the London market \$50,000,000 in French five per cent. treasury bills. The official announcement of this is expected to be issued within a few days.

Another Aerial Raid.

PARIS, Jan. 2.—Dunkirk, on the northern coast of France, was again bombarded by four German aeroplanes Thursday, according to reports which reached Paris during the night.

Emperor Francis Joseph Well.

GENEVA, Jan. 2.—(Via London.) A Swiss diplomat who returned here yesterday from Vienna, where he saw Emperor Francis Joseph Christmas day, says the monarch looked physically well, but seemed sadder and more anxious than usual.

Four German spies were arrested Thursday at Della, France, near the Swiss frontier. They were taken by train to Belfort for court-martial. It is said that compromising documents were found on the men.

NORTHERNERS LOSE TO THE CHAMPIONS

Warton Secures Short End of An 8 to 2 Score in New Year's Game.

The much-touted Warton aggregation met the Berlin O. H. A. intermediate champions at the auditorium last evening and got the short end of an 8 to 2 score. The victors won on their merits although the Northerners demonstrated that as last year they will be heard from before the season is over. As it was, starting the penetrating of the nets forty-five seconds after the game had begun they held the champions until the beginning of the third period. The score at the end of the first twenty minutes of play was 2 to 1 in favor of Berlin, and at the end of the second period 3 to 2. Towards the end of the game the locals became stronger and outplayed the visitors. In the last forty-five seconds of play they notched two goals, making the score 8 to 2.

The champions showed good form and tried some successful experimenting. In the first period the regular line-up was used. In the second Solomon was replaced by Roschman. The latter's position was filled by Hiller who showed that he was undergoing a steady improvement in form and strength. In the middle of the second period Washley of the visitors in a collision with one of his team-mates was sorely injured and had to leave the ice. Roschman went off to even the sides, each of which finished the game with six men.
