G. T. P. TO REACH EDMONTON IN Construction Proceeding R.—Yellow Head Pass Is 'Favored Route' PROGRESS OF SURVEYS IN MOUNTAINS No Decision Has Yet Reached Regarding Pass To Be Followed

Winnipeg, Oct. 11.—C. W. Wood Schreiber, consulting engineer to the Dominion government and chief engineer of the western division of the Grand Trunk Pacific for the government, on an interview here, stated that the construction was proceeding fairly considering the great difficulty of the labor. "The labor isn't country, and cannot be obtained readily," he said. "That is the trouble with working from Portage is up as far as Edmonton. The work is generally pretty well covered. The distance is 730 miles; and of that would probably be some 200 miles. I fully anticipate the rails will be laid to Edmonton the first of next year. Of this depends much upon the weather; if there is any shortage of timber, a considerable amount of construction will be done during the winter. They have to pierce and there are a great number of things to be excavated. Then they will have to get together the necessary information, and it is generally believed that by next spring the route will have been decided through the mountains.
