LARGER POST CARDS

CANADA IS HER OWN MISTRESS

Speaker Disallows Question On Dominion In British House.

London, June 16.—Mr. Lambert, member for South Molton, in the Commons yesterday asked if the Government was aware that the Canadian Government had confiscated \$7,000,000 pounds, mainly British capital expended in the construction of railways in Canada and added: "Is it not a fact that the Canadian Government refused facilities to the Grand Trunk to raise its rates to maintain working expenses?" Omsky Gars, Under-Secretary for the Colonies, said British did not intend to make representation to the Canadian Government or raise the question of the economic conference. The Speaker finally decided that injury among members of Parliament shows that they entirely endorse the Speaker's decision not to allow Canada's internal questions to be discussed on the floor of the British House. One member tells me he failed after a long argument to convince the Speaker that British members had the right to raise Canadian questions where British interests were involved, the Speaker having replied in effect: "No, I don't like it. Canada is her own mistress. We must think of her with consideration and good will. It is not the business of the British House to add to inevitable difficulties in the complex relationship of the free nations which make up the partnership of the British Commonwealth."
