Baptist Notes.

S. N. Jackson, Esq., of Clarence sends the following to the Messenger and Visitor:—

The second week in November, our pastor the Rev. R. R. Kinley engaged in special services at Paradise, assisted by our young brother A. D. Duggan, who came to us last fall from Dr. Simpson's Missionary Training Institute of New York.

Bro. Duggan is one of our own boys and one of the Lord has without doubt called to do great work of the master. The leaders of the cross bars two iron supports are fastened, carrying the supporting wires for the masts.

Two lanterns fastened on the under side of the cross bar carry charged wires which feed a motor on the top of the running mast.

An alternating dynamo at each end of the line will supply power enough to make each box travel at a rate of twenty miles an hour.

At each end of the line from Bridgewater to Digby there is sufficient water at a cheap rate to furnish mechanical power for the dynamo.

The boxes are to be of three-eighth inch steel well fitted with lock and hinges. Each box and motor will weigh about forty pounds with ordinary contents.

Each post will have a box of its own to avoid confusion and delay. By an automatic appliance the box on reaching its post will be shunted off and run into the building if required.

In the main line the wire will make contact and allow the motor to pass on.

In winter a heating current could be sent through the supporting wires, melting any ice that may have formed upon them.

Weather, therefore, would have no effect upon the efficiency of the system.

At the present cost to the government for conveying mail between the places named above would be put into operation at all expense incidental to it.

We feel that the time has come when we would enjoy the advantages of increased celerity and security in the transmission of their mail matter.

In the instance of the twenty-four mile road between the places named above there are no special advantages over the average of other mail routes in the province.

Water power is most always available, and in a hilly country the system would be a further advantage over the present system.

It can be readily seen that the local mail system in operation in the province on all routes where the expensive mail coach is now running a large amount of money could be saved.
