A company in New York City is endeavoring to perfect a process for mesiocation of garbage, with a view to utilizing the vast quantity of city , rom through a chute into one end of a revoiving cylindrical oven about inty feet long by ten or twelve feet in diameter. The oven, which is trany conssructed of boiler iron, is inclosed in a orick furnace, one end aigg higher than the other. A fire in the furilace keeps an equal heat in woven, and the latter is slowly revolved by 2 stean engine. The garbage Trefuse enters at the elevated end, is thuroughly stirred and dried as is ionly travels from one end to the other of the retolving oren, and emerges en ite lower end desiccated and inoffensive.

During the heat of the electiun campaign the Quelsec Jfureury, a Connervatove jourmal, mad: clarges of boodling against Mayor I, angelier, which have sulne been insestinated in the courts and proved to be utterly ground. less. 'The editor of the dfereury has been sentune in six months' minfromment in addition to having to pay a heavy finc. It is a pity that the editors of all the newsapers who have indulaed in this despicable kind of political watare had not to undergo a similar sentence. Ifow many of the five hundred editors of Canadian papers would, in this case, be now behind the bars, is a question that party journals might discuss with advantage.

The experiment of workingwomen's clubs, which was begun in New York about fout years ago, has succeeded far beyond the expectations of its promoters. In the parent society during the past year there has been an average attendance of 106 members. They have rooms in the central part of the city. With dues amountin: to but twenty-fire cents a month and some extra fecafor the payment of teachers, they enjoy advantages which were formerly out of their reach as individuals. Anoug the occupations which have bren exercised to advantage by the parent club and the many branches that have sprung up in New lork and sicinity are dressmaking, type writing, millinery and drawing

In the centre of the tobacco warehouses at the London docks there is an immense kiln, whicn is kept cuntmually burning lay and night, and goes by the name of the Queen's tobaceo pipe. The Ene:lis', Guvers,ment has a differert way of treatiog confiscated articles than that in use in this country, olte of them being to uthlize them as fuel for what is termed the Queen's smoking Whenever merchandise is seized fur non-payment of duty, or because it is considered under the law as in a daniaged or unsalable condition, it is taken to this ereat kiln and is buried there, the owners having no remedy. There is a similar but smailer Queen's tobacco pipe in the Guvernment tubacco warchouses at Iive rpool.

It is not quite clear as to what has caused the present strained relations between Great Britain and Hayti. On the one side it is affirmed that Britain is simply pressing the Haytian Guvernment for the payment of an old debn. but this is demed, and the canse of the trouble is altributed to the controversy which has prown out of the leaking of certain forest lands on the Istand of Fortugas to a Madame Maunders; who, having failed to pay to the Il.gyan Government tle stipulated rental, was deprived of the use of ile preproty. As Mivlame Maunders is a Histian by birth, we cannot see wioat die dritesh Guvernment has to dis with her claim, but that it has in sume way become mixed up in the affir, there is little reason to doubt. The disp ute with Venezuela, which is said to hate caused the British Minister tu withdraw ire m Cararas, is the eld ore about the boundary of British Guiana. The fromiter line of these British colonial possessions has never get been determined. The dispute un the question has been not only with Venezuela, but whiz brazal, and it dates back several generations to the time of Dutch control. The lintish claim is founded largely on that of physical or matural boundaries, and demands, in its extreme form, the inchusion of all the rekions draned by the waters which find their ontlet into the river lisseguibo. If thas chain should be admitted it would cover an area of somethiur like So,coo sequare miles, extending as far as the Curyatan, which separates 1?ratish from Dutch Guiana. But Tenezuela's claim weald greatly reduce this area. Inthesto the controvery has not been pushed to extremes, but some miang hiscoveries in the disputed tract west of the Essequibo have revived it. lhere would seem to be a fair chance for arbitration in . question of this character.

The pet theory indulged in by so many of the lords of creation as to the inferiority of the fibre of woman's brain seems to have been thoroughly exploded by the way in rhich she mastered the abtruse arts and sciences when ouce she had the chance. When the history of the present ceatury shall come to be written the advancement made by women as regards education, boih social and professional, will ve one of the most conspicuous incidents recorded. This advancement is conceded as phenomenal, even by those who never doubted woman's mental capacity, and the inferior-braintubre fanatics are fairly put to route. They, howevor, find some small consolation in pertinaciously clinging to the statement that we have no great fumale musicians, and that the women artists have in the past gained fame solely from their scarcity. They forget that even so late as ficty years ago the systematic training of women in music and art was 2 thing almost unknown. It is true that women of even a remote day learned a little music as a polite accomplisthment, but the thorough training tending to develope talent to the utmost wias unheard of, while an art school for women did not exist, and the list of artists of that day represents merely isolated instances of such iustruction. That any one of them succeeded in winuing a name is marvellous, cunsidering the difficulies with which they were hedged about.
