Two fine vessels were launched at Levis, opposite Quebec, a few days ago. The Cambria, from the yard of Mr. Sanson, is a bark of 1,313tons; and the Cheshire, from the yard of Mr. Charland, is also a bark rig of 1,354 tons.

The assessment of Dundas, Ont., is S995,-700; population 3,768. There is an increase of \$12,980 in the assessment, and a decrease of 73 in population compared with 1884, the latter due probably to dullness in the local cotton and shoddy mills.

Some clever thief took advantage of the Provincial holiday, the 14th inst., to enter the office of the license department of the City Hall, open the safe and extract therefrom \$2,-000, of which \$1,200 was in cash, and the balance in cheques. Payment of the cheques has been stopped.

The seeding on low lands throughout Peel, Wellington and neighboring connties of Ontario has been much delayed, owing to the unusual lateness of the Spring. The town ships are rapidly taking advantage of the "Drainage Act," which in the future will in a great measure obviate this difficulty.
