THE NEWFOUNDLAND DUTIES. Messrs. Kingman, Brown & Co. have redeived telegrams from St. John's, Nfld., stating that the Bonavista, which took down a large cargo of flour for Newfoundland, will be unable to land her cargo there unless immediate action be taken by the Government. The Bonavista left this port with 10,000 barrels of flour and with a large amount of pork. The duties which the Newfoundland Government had determined to impose were increased on flour from 80 cents per barrel to \$1 per barrel, and on pork \$2 perbarrel.

THE HOME.

"DAISY" DISHES.

LOBSTER CREAM (an eptide)-Take the flesh from a couple of lobsters, cut it up small, and then pound it in a mortar with the spawn until reduced to a smooth paste; then pass it through a fine sieve, add pepper, salt and grated nutmeg, and mix gradually with it sufficient double cream to make it of the consistency of a thick pures. Just before serving put it into small paper cases and serve cold with some of the spawns prinkled over the top.

OATMEAL DRINK .-- Put three tablespoonfuls of coarse catmeal into three quarts of water and boil it for half an hour; while hot sweeten to taste with brown sugar. Most people prefer it strained. This is very good mixed with cocoa, about half of each, as a hot drink, or it can be flavored with cloves and lemon peel boiled in it. If it is to be drunk cool, one half ounce citric acid may be put to each two or three gallous. Lemon juice is preferable to the acid, but very much dearer. Rice or barley drink can be made in Fifth avenue, New York, is the richest | the same way, using broken rice or barley instead of oatmeal.

LEMON SPONGE.-One lemon, one white of egg, one quarter ounce of gelutine, one onnce of sugar and one gill of cold water. Put the juice of the lemon with half the rind (not the white) of one in the cold water with the soaked gelatine and sugar. Stir and melt all together over the fire, but do not allow it to boil. While this is preparing break the egg and separate the yolk from the white. Beat up the white to a slift froth; drain the gelatine, &c., aside from the fire and let it cool a little; then add gradually to the stiff egg froth. Beat all together until quite stiff. This generally takes from twenty to thirty minutes. Dip a tin or china mould in cold water, then fill with the mixture, which should stand at least half an hour before being used. If preferred, this may be made with oranges. The gelatiae melts more quickly if it is previously soaked in the cold water for an hour.

BEEF ROLLS.—Mince the remains of some cold roast or boiled beef tolerably fine, with a small amount of its own fat; add a seasoning of pepper, salt and chopped herbs; put the whole into a roll of puff paste, and bake for half an hour, or rather longer should the roll

Beef Patties may be made of cold meat by mincing and seasoning beef as directed above, and baking in a rich puff paste in patty tins. STEWED BEEF AND CELERY SAUCE .- Cut three roots of celery into pieces two inches long, put them in a stewpan with a pint of good gravy, two onions sliced, and simmer gently until the celery is tender, let the gravy cool, then add the beef into rather thick pieces; let it just boil up, and serve with fried

CUTLETS OF COLD MUTTON.-Cut the remains of cold loin or neck of mutton into cutlets, trim them and take away a portion of the fat should there be too much. Dip them in beaten egg, sprinkle with bread crumbs and fry them a nice brown in hot dripping. Arrange them on a dish and pour round them either a good gravy or hot

MUTTON PIE .- Cold mutton may be made into very good pies, if well seasoned and mixed with a few herbs. If the leg is used cut it into very thin slices; if the loin or neck, into thin cutlets. Place some at the bottom of the dish, season well with pepper, salt, mace, parsley and herbs; then put a layer of potatoes sliced, then more untton and so on till the dish is full; add the gravy, cover with a crust and bake for one hour.

SPANISH STEAK .- Take one onion, two ounces of beef dripping, one large tablespoonful of finely chopped paraley, one tablespoonful of salad oil, one ditto of good oream, one pint of stock, one dessert spoonful of Tarragon vinegar, pepper and salt. Slice the onion very fine and fry it in dripping; then drain away the fat and out the steak into thin round pieces, scored with the knife; cover each piece with paraley and a few drops of oil; mix the stock with the oil and tarragon vinegar into a thick sauce; pour it into a stewpan, and place each slice of steak gently in the sauce with the fried onions; simmer gently for three-quarters of an hour, add the Nicholas van Benschoter, a goldsmith of Am. oream, stew for another quarter of an hour sterdam.


