Address in reply, 83. Reference in speech from the throne to maintenance of peace; settlement of the I'm Alone incident peacefully by international arbitration; United States Secretary of State Cordell Hull on breaking down of tariff barriers, 83; Henry Wallace on planned redistribution of the national income; getting away from the idea that we must solve our problems by a larger measure of trade; squaring the speech from the throne with actual conditions in the country; the unemployment situation; young men in relief camps; recent Winnipeg tragedy the result of unemployment conditions, 84; profits of large textile companies and wages paid workers in cotton mills; present speech contains more reform measures than any other speech from the throne since 1921, 85; waiting until the eve of an election; reading the speech from the throne in the light of the Prime Minister's radio speeches; Liberal policy largely opposed to government interference and regulatory policies of the government; denouncing the evils of the capitalist system; great contribution made by Prime Minister when he declared definitely for the regulation of industry, 86; recognizing the changed conditions of business; very little actual individual freedom or individual initiative; payment of \$50,000 to Sifton estate by Mr. Sweezy for assistance in the Beau-
