Tattoo Marks on Arm Aided in Identifying Ernest Mitchell.

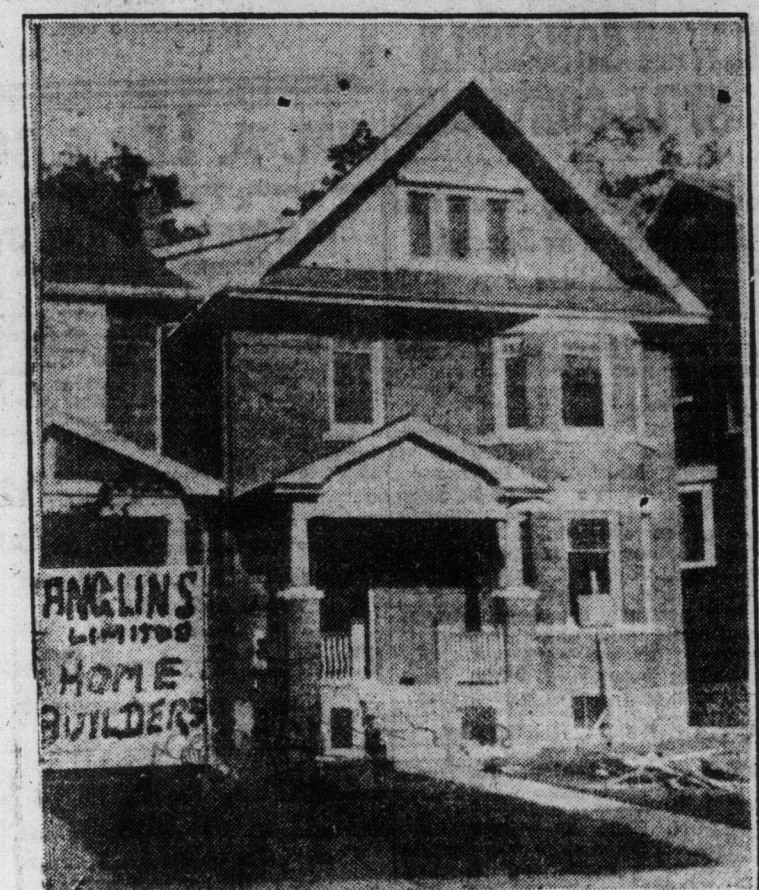

Ontario Railway Board Orders Suburban Railway Co. to Proceed.

FORMER ORDER STANDS

Chairman Was Surprised That Work Had Been Long Delayed.

Work deferred brought a sharp rebuke from the chairman of the Ontario Railway Board yesterday morning, and in consequence construction will at once commence on the Toronto Suburban Railway line on Pacific avenue. West Toronto. The order to this effect had been given last April, but on the strength of other work being suspended, this also had been held up.

"Conditions on Annette street have nothing to do with the case," said the chairman. "I am surprised that the railway did not carry out the order of the board before this." The judgment brought a complaint from R. B. Henderson, representing the company. Surely the board did not require piecemeal jobs, with a gang working one line here, and later in the same region.

APPEALS HEARD
ON ASSESSMENT

Court of Revision Held First Sitting of Prolonged Session.

At the court of revision yesterday, about 50 cases in which owners of property appealed against the assessment for 1914 were heard. In appealing from the assessment of \$120 per foot on his property at 603-701 West King street, E. F. Flanagan stated that land had been entered in assessment 20 per cent. in one year. As he was forced to admit, however, that land had sold for as high as \$200 per foot in that vicinity, and as the assessment was based on the selling value of the land, it was not changed. The assessment was reduced to \$100 per foot on his land, however, was reduced one hundred dollars.

PRINCE GEORGE, B.C.

There is probably no large undertaking at present being prosecuted in Canada which means more for the development of the Dominion than the construction of the Great Canadian Pacific Railway, and this fact would appear to be realized to some extent by the interest which is being taken in the sale by the company of the Townships of Prince George in British Columbia, which is being held by auction in Vancouver this afternoon. Only about one-sixth of the entire Province of British Columbia is accessible by existing railway lines, and it is considered that Prince George will eventually become one of the largest cities in the interior of the province on account of its central location in the country. For many years the Hudson's Bay location has been there, and it will not doubt be the distributing point for years to come in connection with the development of the vast territory which lies beyond it. It is situated on the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, almost midway between Edmonton and Prince Rupert, and it is expected that the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway from the east will reach Prince George by the end of the present year, when train service will be established from Winnipeg and Edmonton and all eastern points.

SUNDERLAND.

Sunderland Fair was enjoyed by 3000 people, despite the rain, which began at 10 o'clock, which kept thousands at home. The exhibit was larger than last year and of superior quality. A fine number of horses and drivers could be seen at any fair, outside the Toronto Exhibition. J. W. Cowan's team of Percherons were admired by all the weight of this team being 4000 pounds. The poultry show exhibited some 114 crates, all No. 1 birds. The judges kept up to its former reputation. The roots, grain, apples, etc., better than ever. Brock Township is noted for its vast agricultural exhibit, some companies in stock being James Rennie & Son, W. Tocher, J. Miller, Leuke and others. NORWICH. Weather conditions prevented the sixty-second annual exhibition of North Norwich from being perhaps the greatest of the fair, held by the society. Rain fell at intervals all through the day and indeed up to the evening with a terrific downpour. On the other hand, the heavy rain, however, a good crowd was on the grounds in the afternoon. The County Agricultural Society, who are the organizers of the fair, are very proud of being one of the great dairy counties of Canada, and one would naturally expect to find a good display of dairy cattle on the grounds. And such indeed there proved to be. The famous herds of Holsteins of Rottier Bros. and E. Hoot were out in full force and found themselves worthy of their place in the persons of other local breeders who raised them and in some sections were successful in obtaining a good share of the prize money. John McKee, a well-known Ayshire breeder, who is secretary-treasurer of the society, had a fine exhibit of Ayshires on the grounds. The Jersey breed, the Jersey breed of cattle was also splendidly represented by the famous herds of Meadows and Porter of the adjoining Township of Burford, as well as by a number of small local breeders. A splendid exhibit of high-grade dairy cattle was also made by Messrs. C. N. Hillike, D. B. and E. F. Cohoe. Much of the prize money was won by the special prizes offered by Messrs. John White & Co. Woodstock, for the best Jersey cow, and by Messrs. D. B. and E. F. Cohoe, for three magnificent specimens of model type of dairy cows. Laidlaw of Aymer acted as judge.
