Ghurkas Take Knoll. "The northermost objective had now been obtained, but the Ghurkas, pressing under the cliffs, captured an important knoll still further forward—actually due west of Krithia. This they fortified and held during the night, making our total gain on the left precisely 1,000 yards.

"During the afternoon the trenches, a small portion of which remained uncaptured on the right, were attacked, but the enemy held on stubbornly, supported by machine guns and artillery


