COURT-MARTIAL FREES MOSSMAN

Finds Him Not Guilty of Belgian Charge—Will Pay His Expenses.

Kingston, Ont., July 17.—Ex-Gunner Mossman of Belleville, who was tried at Barriefield this morning by court-martial, was found "not guilty" of the charge of committing an assault on an officer in Belgium in November, 1913. The accused was defended by Commandant Evans of the Army and Navy Veterans; the prosecution was conducted by Major Newcombe of the headquarters staff. Lieut.-Col. Crocker was president of the court, and Lieut.-Col. Boggs acted as judge-advocate. Gunner Mossman was released and returned to his home in Belleville. He will be paid for the entire time he has been under arrest. Mossman served in France from February, 1913, until December, 1913, and was a good soldier throughout his service.

MEN ASKED CLOSED SHOP; SO BUSINESS IS SHUT UP

Chicago, July 17.—Ten thousand employees of the McCormick reaper works of the International Harvester Company are locked out today as a result of the closing of the plant for an indefinite period due to a strike which began last Tuesday. The men, who they have not presented their demands, are said to want \$1 an hour pay, a 44-hour week and a closed shop.

"If the men want a closed shop they have it now," said Ralph G. Brooks, superintendent of the McCormick works. "They will have all the closed shop they want, for the plant is closed and is going to remain closed until the men come to work under the conditions they have just left."

Mrs. John Cober, Hesperler, Age 76, Succumbs to Burns

HEAVY PENALTIES FOR FOOD SPECULATORS

French Measure Provides for Reduction of the Cost of Living.

Paris, July 17.—The minister of justice has introduced in the chamber of deputies, the government's bill intended to reduce the cost of living, demanding its immediate adoption. The previous law against speculation included a clause by which it was to expire three months after the cessation of hostilities. In the bill this clause is prolonged to three years and the penalties increased.

Specimens from two months to two years and a fine of from 500 to 50,000 francs. If it affects food, drinks, heat, clothes or shoes, the prison term is raised to three years and the fine to 100,000 francs.

The penalties may be further raised to five years imprisonment and 200,000 francs fine if the merchandise is not such as the accused person regularly deals in.

The posting of prices which are entered for restaurants is extended to hotels and also to rooms, heating materials, shoes and clothes. Measures will be taken to prevent the increasing of rates unduly, especially by the concealment of the fact that apartments are empty.

THOUSAND SCARBORO JOYS TASTE CARBON

More than 1,000 children from the orphanages of the city enjoyed the annual outing arranged for them by the Ontario Motor League, who inaugurated the annual bright spot in the lives of the children some 13 years ago. The children were picked up in Queen's Park by 150 decorated motor cars belonging to members of the league and taken to Scarborough Beach, where the amusements were all thrown open to the children.

Over sixty gallons of milk were sent to the beach in order that the boys and girls might have plenty to drink, and after lunch the children were given ice cream cones and other dainties. The children came from the following institutions: The Protestant Orphan's Home, the West End Orphan, the Central Neighborhood House, the Jewish Mission, the Victoria Street Orphan, the East End Orphan, the Danforth Day Nursery, the Carmelite Sisters, and the Sacred Heart Orphanage.

INDIANS ANXIOUS TO SEE PRINCE OF WALES

Indians throughout the country are generally disturbed at the rumor that the Prince of Wales will not pay a visit to their reserves and encampments, according to Omoooyok Loft, a Six Nations chief and a former lieutenant in the Forestry Corps.

The Indians wanted the prince to attend a council of chiefs where he would smoke the pipe, and where other native entertainments would be offered him.

New Brunswick Instructs Delegates Regarding Tariff

St. Stephen, N.B., July 17.—The Liberal convention called by Hon. W. F. Foster to elect delegates to the national convention yesterday chose Hugh M. Balkam, George M. Byron and Daniel P. Gilmour. The delegates were not instructed by the convention other than on the high cost of living and the tariff. A resolution was adopted urging the vital necessity of the immediate removal of the tariff on all necessities of life, the immediate reduction or entire removal of the tariff on all agricultural implements.

FOREST FIRES ENDANGER TOWNS IN AMERICA

Spokane, Wn., July 17.—Forest fires fanned by heavy winds are threatening timber and livestock in western Montana and northern Idaho according to reports received today by federal forest officials here. Several small towns are also reported in danger of destruction. The flames have caused the fire fighting crews to retreat.

REFUSE ITALY'S REQUEST.

Paris, July 17.—The Inter-allied council today refused Italy's request that Austrian concessions at Tien Tsin, China, be transferred to her.
