by the best possible means of mail communication and travel transportation, and that to this end it is advisable that Great Britain should be connected with Canada and New Zealand with Australia and New Zealand, by the best service available within reasonable cost; that for the purpose of carrying the above project into effect such financial support as may be necessary should be contributed by Britain, Canada, Australia and New Zealand, in equitable proportions.

The End.  
Laurier proposed and Deskins seconded a resolution expressing sincere appreciation of Lord Elgin's conduct of the business of the conference, and the premier's deep sense of gratitude for the generous hospitality which had been extended to them by the government and people of the United Kingdom. Lord Elgin responded, expressing the hope that the ambition he had cherished of assisting in making the conference a success from the point of view of business, had been largely fulfilled.

The conference then separated.

## TORONTO ON DIRECT ROUTE.

Railway Connections Which Will Bring City Into Touch With West.

## TORONTO TO RIVAL MONTREAL.

Editor World: I read in The Gazette (Montreal), May 11, 1907, an article of yours, entitled: "A Toronto Walk: Wants the Province of Ontario to Get a name and a Capital for Toronto," where it is said:

"The people of Ontario should... connect with the transcontinental railways thereby."

These connections are to be made soon.

1. The Canadian Pacific Railway constructed a direct railroad from Toronto to Sudbury, now delivered over to passengers and traffic to Oshawa, and which shall probably be finished in July next.

2. The Canadian Northern Ontario Railway built also a nearly parallel railroad from Toronto to Sudbury, terminated now to Parry Sound, which shall reach Sudbury in the very near future, and afterwards shall be continued from Sudbury to Port Arthur, where it will be connected with the Canadian Northern Railway's line, going now to Winnipeg and Edmonton, and being in construction further towards the Pacific.

3. A company has applied to the federal and the provincial parliaments in order to build railroads connecting the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway's main line with the diverse lines of the Grand Trunk Railway. One of these projected railroads is to leave the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway near Albany Bay, pass north or near Sudbury, and join with the Grand Trunk Railway System about Scotia Junction. Another railroad shall produce the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway's Toronto-North Bay line till its meeting northwards with the Grand Trunk Railway's main line.

So, this present year, Toronto shall have a direct communication with the Canadian west provinces, and several in the near future. So, Toronto shall be on the direct route from New York and Boston to the Canadian west, and to the United States' Northwest.

But, in order that such a position may give to Toronto whatever profit possible, it is necessary the Canadian Pacific Railway may organize direct trains from Toronto respectively to Vancouver, B. C., and to St. Paul, Minn.

neapolls and Duluth, with Pullman cars coming from New York and from Boston, and destined to be attached at Toronto to the aforesaid direct trains.

If so, Toronto shall derive a very great benefit from its position near the great Canadian harbors, New York and Boston, and on the route of the immigrants from these harbors westwards.

Where the immigrants shall pass shall also pass the merchandise.

Then, in matters of business, Toronto shall succeed in rivaling Montreal.

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## SILENCED AS WITNESS HEARD AS ATT'Y-GENERAL

## Hon. Mr. Turgeon Says He Was Approached on a "Hushing-Up" Errand.

QUEBEC, May 14.—(Special).—Yesterday's sensations in the Asselin libel case in the criminal court, including the confronting of the acting attorney-general with a letter alleged to discuss contributions to the election fund from the syndicate negotiating with the government for a land deal, were as nothing compared with scenes enacted to-day. This morning Hon. Mr. Turgeon, producing a letter, said he had a declaration to make. The judge said there was nothing to demand departure from the ordinary rules of evidence. Last and shown the pretended copy of the allegedly attempted by question after question, to allow the minister to regard the topic on my shoulders as nothing but a rag." The court disallowed the question, adding that he strongly recommended the attorney-general to convolve immediately a fresh term of court to proceed against these guilty of such an attempt.

At the afternoon session Mr. Turgeon appeared at the King's counsel bench and as acting attorney-general changed he had been approached at Mr. Lafamme's instance on Sunday last and shown the pretended copy of a letter from Baron Lepine about contributions to election funds, which was to be destroyed with other supposed compromising documents if he would enter a note of acquiescence in the present prosecution against Asselin. He had indignantly rejected the proposition.

He now declared as acting attorney-general that he should institute criminal proceedings against Lafamme and should also cite him before the bar of Montreal.

Lafamme declared he had made no attempt at all to effect a compromise, and that he had been approached by Mr. Turgeon on Sunday last and shown the pretended copy of a letter from Baron Lepine about contributions to election funds, which was to be destroyed with other supposed compromising documents if he would enter a note of acquiescence in the present prosecution against Asselin. He had indignantly rejected the proposition.

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
