# HALF DOZENS TOBACCO SNEGLING CASES.

The Parties Arrested at Niagara Falls Have a Location in the Ambitious City.

## CHIEF TWISS COMES OUT ON TOP

And Now the Red Lion Man Has a Case or Two on His Hands—General News.

Hamilton, March 23.—(Special).—The Oliver and Johnson, who were arrested at Niagara Falls, N. Y., charged with smuggling tobacco, had rooms here at 76 Catharine street north. Other boarders in the house said today that a good many trunks and boxes were brought to the house and it was suspected the trio were smugglers. The customs officers say Johnson had a bonded warehouse here, and dealt in Sunnata leaf chiefly. The duty on Sunnata in Canada is 10 cents a pound, while in the United States it is \$1.50, which makes smuggling of it a profitable venture. Recently Johnson advertised for a partner to go into a Sunnata leaf tobacco business.

**Twiss Acquitted.**  
At the adjourned hearing of the charge against Chief Twiss at Dundas this morning, the chief gave evidence, completely rebutting the charges. He proved that at the time he was said to be accepting Alvin's bribe, he was away from the city. Lawrence and Mallett in the Town Hall, Charles Collins also gave evidence that he had no knowledge of the alleged bribe. Chief Twiss was acquitted on all charges. Mayor Fisher honorably discharged Chief Twiss. Mills has now to answer a charge of violating the liquor law, laid by Inspector Jarvis, in addition to the one laid by Chief Twiss.

**New Mileage Books.**  
The H. G. & B. Railway Company has withdrawn its 1000 mile and 500 mile books, which sold at one cent a mile, and has issued 400 mile books for families at \$3, and the residents of Saltfleet Township are given equal privileges with residents of other portions of the line. Shortly after the township began legal action against the company, the latter cut off the mileage book privileges in Saltfleet. The Saltfleet residents claim the change as a victory.

**Police Point.**  
At today's police court John Hill, a Para-diser-dor-farmer, was charged with violating the Health Act by feeding his pigs with unboiled horse flesh. The case was laid over till Saturday at the request of Hill.

**William Theaker's Body Found.**  
This evening about 6 o'clock William Allan, a switchman, saw a body floating on the bay near the foot of the bridge. He notified the police and P. C. Tulke secured it after much effort, he throwing a rope over it. The body proved to be that of William Theaker, 300 Hingham street north, who disappeared one afternoon in January. His skates were on his feet and it is supposed he skated into an air hole. The lad was 17 years old, and two of his brothers are conductors on city street railway. No inquest will be held.

**Ornamented at Home.**  
An at home was held in the Grand Hall to-night. Charles Elliott presided and stated that Captain Campbell of the Beach Light House had been charged with carrying a knife, with which he was stabbed on July 12, about 30 years ago. Speeches were made by William Theaker, J. H. Hutton, W. Hoyle. Among those who contributed to the musical program were Ben Levi, Evan Korman, and Richardson, Fred Nash and "Shed" Martin. The accompaniments were played by Robert Stamp.

**Minor Matters.**  
The Property Committee decided this afternoon to go on with the re-arranging of the Court House square walks, and the laying of a number of flower beds in it. The body of the late J. V. Beckett will arrive from Englewood, N.J., to-morrow, and the funeral will take place to-morrow afternoon.

**The Chairman and Board of Investigating Governors of the Royal Canadian Mounted Association have unanimously awarded a medal to Nellie Goodwin of North Marysburg, for presence of mind and gallantry in saving Pearl Wamsley from drowning on January 28, 1888.**

# Science Discussed

Passed the Committee of Ontario Legislature With But Few Amendments.

## TORONTO MEMBERS PROTEST.

Street Railway, Telegraph and Telephone Assessment—The Printing Contract.

The Ontario Government monopolized the whole of yesterday with their proposals to increase the revenues of the province. Clause by clause was discussed in committee of the House, and numerous as were the criticisms of the Opposition, Hon. Mr. Harcourt and his colleagues justified and explained the special provisions. Interest in the proceedings had been discounted by the many concessions which the Provincial Treasurer has made in his bill, and which have been already published. No very material alterations were made in the proposals.

**Member for South Perth.**  
The Speaker having announced that he had received the official return of the South Perth election, Mr. Nelson Monteth was introduced to the House by Mr. Whitney (Dundas and York). Mr. Monteth was the new member took his seat amid loud opposition applause.

**On Motion of the Attorney-General.**  
It was resolved that for the remainder of the session Government business shall have precedence over all other business, except private bills, and also that the House sit on Saturday from 11 till 1 o'clock.

**Houses and Exemptions.**  
Mr. Pattullo moved for an order of the House for a return giving information under the following heads: (1) The number of houses and exemptions to manufacturing industries granted by each municipality in the province since the year 1870; (2) The amount of aid by way of loan, with names of firms or companies receiving same; (3) The amount of aid by way of loan, with names of firms or companies receiving same; (4) The amount of aid by way of loan, with names of firms or companies receiving same.

**The Revenue Bill.**  
The House went into committee, with Mr. Straton in the chair, on the Revenue Bill to supplement the revenues of the province. The bill was introduced by Mr. Straton, and was read a first time.

**Natural Gas Companies.**  
In reference to the section respecting natural gas companies Mr. And. Essex and Mr. Gorman (Huron and Huron) moved for a resolution that the bill be amended so as to provide that the levy was out of proportion to that on the ordinary gas companies. Mr. Gorman gave the following figures: The new bill levied on the natural gas companies a tax of one per cent on their paid-up capital, while the ordinary gas companies were taxed at the rate of one per cent on their gross receipts.

**Regulation of Charges.**  
Mr. Wardell (South Westwont), in reference to the regulation of charges of natural gas companies, moved for a resolution that the House do not assent to the bill in its present form, which would allow any company to sell its product.

**Interference With Municipal Taxation.**  
Mr. Wardell objected to the exemption of street railway, telegraph and telephone companies from municipal taxation. He stated that the bill would allow these companies to pay a tax of one per cent on their gross receipts, while other companies would pay a tax of one per cent on their paid-up capital.

**Women Workers to Organize.**  
The Trades and Labor Council met last night. Delegate Woodley wanted the Legislative Committee to discuss the bill before the House.

**A Peculiar Mishap occurred to the Grand Trunk train, while on its way from the north to Woodstock on Wednesday evening. When nearing Woodstock the passenger coaches broke away from the freight half and when the station was reached, the engine was surprised to find that only half its train had arrived. An engine was sent for the passengers and a few miles out the cars were found on the tracks. Among those on board were a number of commercial travelers.**

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
