WOLSELEY LEAVES FOR CAPE TOWN ADJUBRNED AT 2 O'CLOCK London PERHAPS TO HELP LORD KITCHENER



London, March 14.—Field Marshal Lord Wolseley, the former Commander-in-Chief of the British army, starts for Cape Town to-morrow, and, altho the officials deny that his trip is anything but a private visit, gossip connects it with the military situation. It is pointed out that Lord Wolseley's knowledge of South Africa, gained as a fighter and administrater, might be highly useful to Lord Kitchener either at the base (Cape Town) or at Pretoria. Lord Wolseley himself says his trip is entirely private. Colonel Frank Rhodes and Arthur Rhodes, brothers of Cecil Rhodes, and Lady Methuen will be passengers on the steamer which will take Lord Wolseley to Cape Town.
