The object of our contemporary, in bringing the matter into prominence at this time, appears to be to make an indirect argument against the London Street Railway Company dealing with organized labor in its collective capacity. Here is the sting in the tail of our contemporary's state-

"Manager Pollock says that but for the strike the firm would not have thought of leaving the city, but their recent experience has caused a desire

to get away from unions.' A representative of The Advertiser today interviewed the secretary-treasurer of the Laidlaw-Watson Company on the subject. The interview appears elsewhere in this issue, and makes very interesting reading.

The company state that, while the recent dispute (now settled amicably) may have been the means of causing Aylmer to make special proposals, it was not the former settled dispute with the union that decided them to go to the town mentioned, but the extraordinary financial inducements offered.

The Laidlaw-Watson Company, as

London the Beautiful.

There are few pleasanter cities on homes than our beautiful London. It has no slum quarters of Hungarians, Poles or Chinese. Possibly, if the policy of some of the Pennsylvania coal barons were adopted here, and hordes of these nationalities were imported to take the places of self-respecting, English-speaking artisanspossibly, in that case, we say, London might have a few hundreds more of population. But we are not so sure that it would; probably for every Hungarian, or Pole, or Chinaman, brought in, a better English-speaking man would have to leave the city to seek that employment denied him at home. But supposing, for the sake of argument, that it would increase the population by a few hundreds. If they got less than a living wage, they would not be of adequate value to our merchants as customers; they would not be able to bring up and educate their families as they should; they would be deprived of the opportunity of becoming desirable citizens. Depend on it, the questions of the living wage, and of the self-respect of individuals, and of the community, are closely related. We have no slums in London, and do not wish to have any.

The Hamilton and London

Street Railways. The Hamilton street railway employes have been circumstanced much the same as the London employes, The Hamilton men had been working 60 hours per week, at 15 cents per hour; but the company tried to induce them to accept a working schedule of 66 hours per week at 131/2 cents per hour. The men were not agreeable to the change, and several of the more prominent of them were discharged. The men felt that they must organize in self-defense, and the union was then formed. The period of friction came to an end a week ago,, when the Company signed an agreement with the employes, recognizing them as a union, and establishing the old

scale of \$9 per week. In London, as in Hamilton, there was no thought of a union among the street railway employes until the Company began to cut wages-at a time, too, when their profits, already large, were growing larger every month. If the Company do not like Unionism, why did they create it?

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
