

BISHOP WILL SEE HIS BROTHER HERE

His Lordship of London, Eng., Has Relatives a Short Distance From This City.

The approaching visit of His Lordship the Bishop of London, Eng., is attracting not a little attention. His lordship is recognized as one of the leading ecclesiastics of this century, and he is recognized as a great power for good in England. He was invited to address the Ecumenical Council in New York, and seized the opportunity to visit his brother, Mr. Frank Winington Ingram, who lives on a farm near Aylmer, about 30 miles from London.

The bishop has long expressed a desire to visit Canada, and especially to see his brother, of whom his lordship is very fond. Mr. Ingram goes to England periodically to see the bishop, who has shown a great interest in Canada and its future. That interest has grown deeper during the past few years, as many of his poor parishioners of London have come to this country to get a start in life, and many have come to Ontario and done well through the advice of Mr. Frank Ingram, who has done well in this country. The first invitation to preach in Canada was given by the little Anglican Church in Aylmer, where his brother worships.

The Ingram Family.
The Ingrams come from a long line of clergy. Their father was for a lifetime rector of a splendid parish in England, and two of the sons, besides the bishop, have parishes. Another of the boys went to sea, and became captain of a man-of-war. Another went to India. Frank thought he would come to Canada. He was an Eton boy, educated under the celebrated Dean Farrar, but decided to follow farming. He came to Aylmer, and settled on a farm on the shores of Lake Erie, at the spot called "Groveend." Here he married, and has no desire to return to the old country to live. He owns a very beautiful farm, one of the most pleasant spots along the lake shore. It is here the bishop will spend most of his time while in Canada.

The Bishop's Brother.
Mr. Frank Ingram is a splendid character. Quiet, unassuming, modest, he pursues the even tenor of his way, "far from the madding crowd's ignominious strife." The busy haunts of men have not appealed to him, and the simple life of a country gentleman has been his ideal. A scholar and a thinker, he is a most companionable man, and one well beloved by his neighbors. Had he seen fit to devote his talents to a busier life he too might have made a great name for himself, but he chose otherwise. He is anticipating his brother's visit with great pleasure.

Gigantic Struggle Between Whites And Blacks Only a Matter of Time

So Says an Abyssinian Priest Who Is Lecturing in This City.

Rev. Father C. F. Checchelli, an expert of the Coptic Church of Abyssinia, the kingdom of Ras El Menelik II., the conqueror of the Italian regiment, is in this city. He has been conducting services for the last few days at Newbury and Appin Methodist Churches, and last night was at the town hall of Glenora. He has had the best advantages of European universities, and is an A. B. of Oxford, and B. Sc. of Cambridge, England.

A Great Traveler.
He has been traveling extensively through the various sections of the United States, and has had varied experiences, some of which he will tell this evening. In his sermon to be given at 8 o'clock in the Colored Baptist Church on Horton street, between Clarence and Wellington.

Father Checchelli claims to be a convert from Judaism to the Christian faith, being a Nestorian Gnostic, who had been brought up to look upon Jesus as a product of the highest type of man, but not wholly divine; and his intentions are to acquaint himself with all foreign ideals of ethical, educational, commercial and Christian enlightenment to further the evolution of the black nations.

Speaking of his views as to existing

conditions he said to The Advertiser today:

A Race War.
"The psychological phases of the age demonstrate that moral religion shall dominate the world in the future, which general conception is the survival of the fittest."

"The alarming cry that seems to dominate the various nations, varying in color is only the moral predecessor of a gigantic struggle that will be between the blacks and yellows on one side and the various whites on the other to arrest the respective continents of Africa and Asia."

Africa for the Blacks.
"The blacks and yellow peoples have suffered more than any other nations, since losing the control of the physical government of the world, for they were the prime actors in making governments. It was the black hands that architecturally designed an Egypt and a Babylon; the black hands that formed a Solomon's temple, a pyramid, and commercial ships; the black classist, a Homer, who roused the dormant souls of the Greeks; the black Sapho, who awakened the purity of her sex; the black Pythagoras who championed the principles and rights of the weaker, and stormed the bulwark of Diabolus."

Black Man Slandered.
"There are so many pusillanimous critics by stage-plank agitators of the inferiority of the dark-skinned nations, that were some of the critics, not extolled to the towering pinnacles of Christian leaders and self-assumed intellectuals, we could have passed them over, but as a representative of the ebony-hued part of the black race, I can only say that were the black man given the same rights of his lighter-brother, he would show the same advancement. Africa shall in the short future be entirely ruled by blacks, after it shall have fully become enlightened."

FRENCH ADVANCED OVER KITCHENER

Former Would Have Supreme Command in the Event of a War.

London, Aug. 28.—The English cables say that Sir John French has been appointed inspector-general of the army, coupled with a plain intimation from the ministry that the incumbent of that office will take supreme military command in the event of war on a large scale.

Sir John, although a gallant and able officer, is at the very foot of the list of generals; whereas Lord Kitchener is at its head. Hitherto it had been understood that in the event of war the chief command would be taken by the chief of the general staff, and it was universally believed that Lord Kitchener would be appointed to this office as soon as ever he returned from India. His term of office as commander-in-chief in India was to have expired this year, and very reluctantly he yielded to the pressing insistence of the home Government that he would remain in India for eighteen months or two years longer, to personally direct the execution of his scheme of military reorganization, which has excited the admiration of the leading experts of the age. He was made to feel that if he would remain at the expense of his inclinations and of his health, his interests would not suffer, and now he finds a junior in rank, who has only been promoted to the rank of full general within the last few months, appointed in his absence for a term of years to the post which he had every right to expect, in view of his services. Lord Kitchener is blunt and Sir John is diplomatic, and is a favorite with the Prince and Princess of Wales.

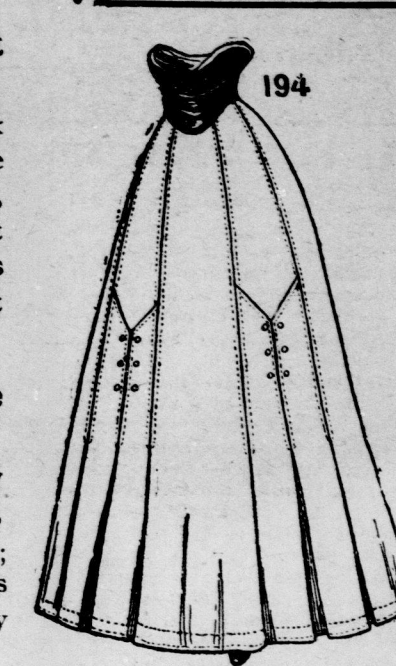
