## FAMOUS PLAYER IS KILLED IN ACTION

Lt. Robt. Powell, One of Canada's Best Tennis Players, Gives Life on Battlefield.

VICTORIA, B.C., May 4.—Robert Powell, tennis singles champion of British Columbia for several years, was killed in action in France, April 28, according to word received here today. Powell was an attorney, and was private secretary to the lieutenant governor of British Columbia from 1900 to 1904. He founded the North Pacific Lawn Tennis Association in 1904. The next year he won the tennis championship of Scotland.
