New G. T. R. Line to Manitoba, Enabling It to Compete With

Crow's Nest Pass Line Likely to be Completed to the Coal Mines

The C. P. R. has raised the blockade on its western line route, and trains are now running by that route to Ottawa

The Intercolonial Railway, it is now positively announced, will be extended to Montreal on March 1. A new freight tariff has been issued. There will be no ncrease of rates.

The Grand Trunk made a fast run with 25 cars of cattle from Sarnia tunnel to Toronto recently, covering the distance (174 miles) in nine hours. The officials claim that considering the bad weather and heavy tracks this was doing pretty well.

The volume of freight being received by the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways is in excess of the amounts received during the same period of last year. The C. P. R. authorities state they are handling much more freight, both free and in bond, than is usually their share, while the Grand Trunk say their business is not falling off.

The G. T. R. depot at St. Thomas is undergoing changes which are decidedly in the nature of improvements. All the offices are being put in thorough order, new floors being put in some, and all being papered and kalsomined. It is expected, however, that in a short time a fine modern depot will be built where the present one stands. The superintendent, dispatchers and clerks of the Wabash will all take possession of the offices on Tuesday. A joint meeting of the Wabash and

Grand Trunk officials was held in Detroit on Thursday to complete arrangements for the running of Wabash trains between Detroit and Buffalo, over the Great Western division of the Grand Trunk. It was decided that the following fast freight lines should operate with the Wabash over the Canadian division: Rome, Waterford and Ogdensburg; Ontario dispatch; Lehigh and Wabash, and Hoosac Tunnel line. The new deal takes place March 14.

The G. T. The Ontario Government's Past and Future Programme.

Nickel Mine Owners Must Manufacture in the Province.

At West Hamilton nomination Hon. J. M. Gibson handled J. J. Scott's argument that the Ontario Government had lost millions to the province during twelve years by its timber policy, without gloves. What Mr. Scott did not know about the timber business would fill a large book. The Ontario Government had endeavored years ago to keep an export duty on logs in an effort to get the lumber manufactured in this country. The Conservative Govern-ment at Ottawa, however, had taken charge of the timber business, and Sir John A. Macdonald knocked off that export duty. The recent measures adopted by the Liberal Government to regulate the timber business had been concurred in by the opposition, the only difference being as to the question of having the new regulations operate on unexpired licenses. The government, notwithstanding Conservative opposi-tion, has decided to keep faith with present holders of licenses and allow these holders to get out this winter's cut of timber unhampered by the new regulations. When Mr. Scott stated that Mr. Gibson had opposed the restrictive measures on this timber business he made a false statement. In connection with the preservation of the nickel deposits of Ontario, the Hon. Mr. Gibson points out that from 1886 to 1896 the Conservative Government at Ottawa had entire control of the question of export duty, and it was that government that permitted the export of nickel from this province to be manufactured in New Jersey. The Ontario Government's policy in this connection was to insist on all charters for nickel companies containing clauses compelling manufacture in Canada. Mr. Scott had made bare promises of what the Conservative party would do to preserve the spruce. The Liberal Government already compelled the manufacture of all spruce, taken from crown lands, into pulp in Canada. As for prison labor, the government had opposed its going into unfair competition with honest labor. The binder twine plant in the Central Prison had injured the cordage combines, but had not injured honest labor. The speaker ably defended the Engledue deal, holding that it would result in great development of the mineral resources of the province. The deal had called the attention of capitalists all over the world to the min-eral possibilities of this province. Not a practical mining man in the country but what has agreed that the deal was a good one for the country. The mayor of Rat Portage (a Conservative) and the Rat Portage News (Conservative) had now come to look with favor on the deal.


