Seven men went down with the trawler Nellie off Aberdeen, despite the coasts guards' efforts with rockets. The men apparently were too numbed to seize the line. A yawl capsized off Howth, Ireland, From Marseilles comes the report that the French steamer Lydie has foundered with 30 hands.

# The Y. P. S. C. E. Of St. Paul's Church

Hold a Special Service to Mark Their Tenth Anniversary.

Able Addresses by Rev. Canon Dann, Rev. Robt. Johnston and Rev. Wm. Johnston, of Huntingford - Active Membership.

The Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor of St. Paul's celebrated its tenth anniversary last evening by a special service held in Cronyn Hall. Rev. Canon Dann and Rev. His Active Interests in Ontario William Johnston, of Huntingford, Robert Johnston, of this city, and Rev. president of the Ontario Christian En-Union, delivered addresses, and the Very Rev. Dean Innes took part in the devotional exercises. Mr. R. Kirkpatrick, in the absence of the president, Miss Baxter, occupied the chair, and in his opening address, said that since the society was organized in 1888 the movement had always been active, and the members were each year showing a strong desire to do more

"The different spiritual organizations among us and how best we should act to draw them closer together in concord," was the theme of Rev. Canon Dann. While the society endeavored to preserve each member in his or her own particular faith, he said, it also strove to bring together the different church organizations into closer relationship. The speaker deplored the fact that there were so many church organizations working independently of each other. The one thing the Christian should aim at was to have the Christian bodies united in spirit and purpose. It was the mere formaliststhose who gave place to the spirit of persecution and narrow-mindednesswho prevented in a great measure the accomplishment of the desired unity. They should try to make every professing member a real member. The people who were attached to a certain church because of politics, or because the clergyman was very amusing, or because it was a matter of business, and those who belonged to every church-the floaters—those were the people who did more injury to the work of God than one could possibly imagine. Although they should be ready to stand up for their own church's principles, yet they should give the same liberty to others, and let all bitterness and wrath be put

"Christian Endeavor and its relation to missions' was the subject of Rev. Robert Johnston's address. The speaker congratulated the Christian Endeavor Society of St. Paul's on having reached its tenth birthday. The Christian Endeavor was a great power, and would accomplish a great work. Its relation to the mission was the same as that of members to the church. So soon as they began to trust in everything else but God's love, his mercy and his power, so soon would all their efforts prove worthless. He urged them to be loyal to the pledge and gospel. Rev. William Johnston, of Huntingford, spoke on "The possibilities of childhood." Seventeen years ago there was one society, with 40 members; now there were 53,226 societies, with 3,130,500 members, connected with 40 denominamembers, connected with 40 denominations, scattered over the face of the earth. Of these 13,000 were junior societies. Of the 469 societies in Canada, 293 were in Ontario. The church's future depended upon the children, and the fact that 20,000,000 juniors were being taught in the schools on Sunday 2,000,000 Christians, meant that the church was recognizing the possibili-
