

London Nurse, Serving in France With American Hospital Unit Reads This Meaning Into the Unprecedented Passage of Men and Munitions.

That the present movements of British, French and American troops in France indicate that the spring will see the greatest Allied offensive on the western front since the war began is the belief of Miss Marion Beal, daughter of C. J. Beal, 431 Waterloo street, who is now nursing in France.

Miss Beal left for service in France with the Johns Hopkins Hospital Unit three weeks after the United States declared war. She writes that a continuous stream of artillery infantry, transport and supplies, such as has never been seen before, passes daily to the rear of the hospital in which she works. Beginning late in December, the stream of troops moving east has continued unabated. Miss Beal asserts the inhabitants of the place contend that never before have such gigantic quantities of supplies and masses of troops moved eastward in such a short time as thy have in the past month.

From Miss Beal's letter it would appear that not only North America, but Europe, also is suffering keenly from a coal shortage. The hospital, in which she holds the rank of captain, is so cold that practically all the nurses are suffering from frost bite and chilblains.
