LONDON A VERY BUSY CENTER
SHOWN IN TRADE BOARD REPORT

Interesting Facts and Figures
Compiled—Large Shipments
of Freight—Train Service.

Secretary Nellies, of the board of trade, has compiled a vast amount of statistics relative to London's commercial, financial and civic life, which are of much interest to the general public, and will shortly be printed in book form and distributed by the board of trade, which this year, under President Stevely, promises to be a very live quantity in the affairs of the city.

Few Londoners have any idea of the business done here by the railways—the C. T. R., the C. P. R., the Pere Marquette, and the M. C. R.

It is not generally known that every day 69 passenger trains arrive and depart from London. Also that each day 182 freight trains arrive and depart.

London's Freight Business.

In 1906, 257,668 tons of freight were shipped out of London, and 592,099 tons were shipped into the city.

The outward shipments in that year were 5,333 tons of lumber, 4,953 tons of live stock, 6,215 tons of flour, 2,730 tons of grain, 3,033 tons of hides, 5,902 tons of machinery, 16,850 tons of ale, 18,243 tons of stoves and iron, and 221,420 tons of miscellaneous freight.

In the same year the following were shipped into London: 623 tons of lumber, 9,264 tons of live stock, 5,737 tons of flour, 32,601 tons of grain, 230,320 tons of bituminous coal, 50,319 tons of anthracite coal, 5,729 tons of fruit, 6,667 tons of machinery, 27,031 tons of iron, and 159,257 tons of miscellaneous freight.

New Time-Table.

The ordinary railway time-table is generally a source of considerable trouble to the traveling public, when they are arranging for a trip to any given point, and though the officials of the passenger department have given this subject a considerable amount of thought and labor, new ideas suggest themselves from time to time, and improvements are made for the benefit of the traveler. The Grand Trunk Rail-way system is probably one of the most difficult lines on this continent to study owing to the many ramifications of their branch lines radiating from the main trunk line, and the innumerable connections made at which a number of junction points. The company, however, have just issued their complete time-table, dated April 30, in which are embodied many new ideas that will be appreciated by the public generally. The idea has been to show the time-table in such a way that any one may see at a glance the route of their train and equipment that will be at their disposal. In the past the through car service has been shown under the local time-table, which necessitated a repetition throughout the folder that created a needless amount of study. This has been obviated by the elimination of all this superfluous data, and all the equipment and condensed time of their trains are shown on six pages, so that any person at a glance can find the time of any particular train, and the exact through car service that is offered on each train.

Another acceptable feature, and one that will be of great help to the traveling public, is a series of tables, showing the condensed time of trains, these tables being surmounted by a map showing the route of any particular train that is shown in this condensed time-table.

Connections via foreign lines, east and west, are also given together with tourist sleeping car service on the Grand Trunk, as well as service from Chicago to points on the Pacific Coast and the southeastern parts of the United States. Other pages are devoted to rail connections from junction points along the main line, steamship connections and stage connections. One page of the folder is devoted to the cab tariff in the cities of Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton, London, Ottawa and Chicago, as well as information as to transfer of passengers and baggage at terminal points. There is also a portion of the folder devoted to information as to baggage which will be of interest to the traveling public.

The folder is an advance on previous railroad time-tables in Canada, and will be gladly received by those who only occasionally travel or by those who are continually moving from place to place.

and the losses in London for the last

ten years—1897 to 1906—is of much interest.

During the decade the firemen responded to 735 alarms.

The total loss on buildings and contents in the ten years was \$23,742,742.

The total insurance carried on buildings and stocks affected was \$5,457,500.

The percentage of loss to insurance carried was only 36 per cent.

It is a notable fact that last year the loss on buildings and contents was only \$48,400. This speaks well for the efficiency of the local fire brigade.

Tax Figures.

Despite the fact that the amount of income exempted has been greatly increased by the new assessment act, Mr. Nellies' figures show that the taxable income of Londoners has increased from \$748,289 in 1896 to \$1,614,135 in 1907.

In the same period taxable realty in London advanced from \$13,730,199 to \$19,415,445.

The total assessment of the city in 1896 was \$16,218,770. In 1907 it was \$22,851,558.

It is interesting to note that in 1896, with a population of 34,855, the gross amount of taxes levied by the city was \$370,324, while in 1906 the figures for 1907 are not yet available, \$533,630 of taxes were collected, the city's population being 43,154.

During 1905, the sum of \$497,145 was spent on new factories and buildings in London, but in 1906 the amount spent for the same purpose jumped up to \$1,200,000.

These are only a few of the figures presented by Mr. Nellies.

The report will undoubtedly prove of the greatest value in the future. It is the most comprehensive work of its kind ever attempted in the city.

JOURNEYING TO CHINA

The Perils of Travel on the Great River of the Empire.

Canadian missionaries laboring in the interior of China have many hardships, even in the matter of reaching the field. The journey across the Pacific is only the beginning. As railways are still very scarce in China, it is necessary to travel in river boats up stream, and at the cataraacts of the Yangtze it is not unusual for the light and poorly constructed boats to go to pieces. The journey takes nearly three months usually, and comfort is at a premium. Naturally the transportation of heavy freight in such a way is very difficult, and it is impossible to avoid

rough handling from time to time.

Miss McIntosh, who is at the mission station of Wei Hwei Pu, a little over a year ago, ordered a piano from Canada. The instrument arrived in due course, and as it was a Gauray, and hence well and carefully built, it stood the journey admirably, in spite of the fact that it got wet, possibly in one of the numerous wrecks to which reference has been made. Miss McIntosh writes as follows to the manufacturer: "Messrs. Gauray, Winter & Leeming: The piano is in very good condition—the tone is good. The pedals are rusted and the varnish blistered a little on the lid, but the instrument looks well, and I am pleased to find it in tune. There are now five pianos in the mission and the Gauray is the favorite." A piano which can spend three months on a Chinese river, besides a month on a freight car, and an ocean steamer, and arrive at its destination in tune is a piano worthy of the splendid reputation the Gauray has already won.

NEW HOUSE SURGEON FOR THE HOSPITAL

Trust Names Dr. McGillicuddy and Also Increases Number of Assistants.

At the regular meeting of the hospital trust held yesterday afternoon in Mayor Judd's office at the city hall, Dr. J. E. McGillicuddy was appointed chief house surgeon at the hospital, while W. G. Russell, A. J. Danks, J. H. Birch, and John Adams were appointed assistant house surgeons.

Dr. McGillicuddy has been a member of the staff since January, and has proved himself to be competent and faithful. He graduated from the Western Medical College in 1906. The four assistant surgeons are also graduates of the Western Medical College, having passed their final this year.

Formerly there have only been three assistant surgeons, but Trustee Graham made a motion to the effect that four be appointed.

Mayor Judd seconded the motion, which carried. The addition of one to the staff was made because with only three and one of them on the sick list, the management always found great difficulty in getting anyone to fill the temporary vacancy. With four assistants, this difficulty would be overcome. It would also allow the management to give each assistant a special line of work.

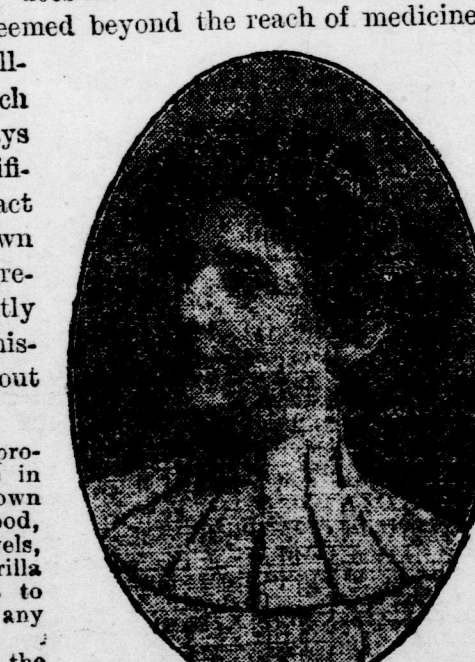

effect that certificates should not be granted to any of the assistants who do not remain at the hospital for a full year unless by special sanction of the board.

Mr. Graham seconded the motion, which carried.

During the last few years many of the young doctors who have been appointed to the position of assistant house surgeons, have left before their year was out, thus leaving the hospital in a predicament. Last year none of the assistants completed their term.

The question of insuring the boilers at the hospital was discussed. The trustees admitted that the \$5,000 already carried was not sufficient, and it was decided to increase it to \$10,000.

Miss Stanley, lady superintendent, suggested that a prize should be given by the board to the nurse whose room in the nurses' home is kept in the best condition. It was moved by Mayor Judd, and seconded by Mr. Graham, that a \$5 prize be given on the 1st of June, and that the lady superintendent and her assistants be the judges. Carried.

Mr. Heard's report for April showed: Number of patients admitted, 59 males, 71 females and 29 children, making a total of 159. The number of patients discharged was 61 males, 68 females, and 24 children, making a total of 153.

The number of births was 13; the number of deaths 9, and the number of operations 36. The number of patients receiving treatment on April 30 was 122. The total receipts for the month were \$1,857.50.
