

AUSTRIAN EMPEROR SENDS EMBASSY TO POPE, URGING PEACE

Kaiser, Too, Dispatches Aide On Secret Peace Mission.

New York, Jan. 5.—The Tribune this morning publishes the following from Arthur S. Draper.

London, Jan. 5.—The Emperor and Empress of Austria-Hungary have sent a special embassy to the Vatican, urgently requesting the pope to intervene for peace.

News of this received here tonight caused a sensation, though it was scarcely unexpected. The desperate economic situation of Austria-Hungary, the revival of the traditional Hapsburg antagonism to Prussia and the imminence of the fall of the Hapsburg dynasty led inner circles to believe that the emperor would make desperate attempts to secure peace.

Even a separate peace between Austria and Italy would save something out of the wreckage of the dual monarchy, and the Allies have been prepared for some such move.

Coupled with this comes a general understanding among Allied diplomatists that another German peace note, written in a minor key, is likely to arrive at any moment. Whether this note will be directed to the neutral powers or to the belligerents is regarded as of little moment, especially as it is generally thought that President Wilson is already acquainted with its general import.

London, Jan. 5.—The German Emperor has sent Prince Adolphus a secret mission to Sofia and Constantinople, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Amsterdam. It is believed his visit is in connection with peace, and the prince is expected to report to headquarters before January 10.

MAX HARDEN PLEADING FOR 'AGREEMENT' PEACE

Famous German Editor Says Allies Can Never Be Defeated.

London, Jan. 5.—Maximilian Harden, editor of the *Zukunft*, delivered a speech at Berlin Saturday, pleading for peace by agreement, according to Reuters' Amsterdam correspondent, who quotes the Berliner Tageblatt.

After referring to the enemy miscalculation of Germany's strength, Herr Harden warned his hearers not to allow themselves to be deceived about the enemy's strength.

"Russia's resources cannot be exhausted," he said, "for, indeed, the war proceeds only on the edges of this world empire. England's hunger, moreover, is only a catchword, for which there is no foundation, while France's lack of men can be balanced by British troops."

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LONDON'S SHARE OF PATRIOTIC FUND TO BE ABOUT \$165,000

Question of Raising It Is Being Discussed.

TAXATION TO PAY PART POSSIBLY \$100,000 IN THIS WAY AND \$65,000 BY SUBSCRIPTIONS.

The question of raising funds for the Patriotic Association has been discussed by Mayor Stevenson, Major Hume Cronyn, and other members of the association, and steps will be taken shortly to get a sufficient amount to carry the work along this year. It is estimated that \$165,000 will be required in 1917.

Last year the sum needed was raised by direct taxation, two mills being placed in the rate to meet this expenditure. The amount given was \$74,000.

The growth of the organization and the demand for assistance is increasing considerably. It is proposed to raise part of the money by taxation, and the balance by subscription. The division has not yet been decided upon, but it has been suggested that \$100,000 be raised by taxation, and the balance, \$65,000, by subscriptions.

"We are looking into the matter carefully, and we will decide later what is to be done," said Mayor Stevenson.

DODGES ONE CONSTABLE, BUT CAUGHT BY ANOTHER

Youngster on Way to Cells Makes Break for Freedom.

While being taken back to the cells at the county jail at 11:30 today from the courthouse, a boy 15 years of age, who had appeared before Judge Macbeth a few minutes earlier and had pleaded guilty to theft, made a dash for liberty from the custody of County Constable Robert Northgrove.

He managed to reach the outer door of the courthouse, and would have escaped, but for High Constable B. W. Waterworth, who rushed out of his office and grabbed him by the coat and held him.

He and two other boys appeared on the steps of the courthouse, and the Star Theatre on New Year's afternoon, the information having been laid by W. H. Smith, the proprietor.

The trio pleaded guilty to the stealing of \$8 in silver and a number of tickets.

Sentence will be passed on all tomorrow, and in the meantime information as to the past record of each will be submitted to Judge Macbeth.

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KEWANES CLUB IS ORGANIZED IN CITY BY BUSINESSMEN

Aims At Fair Prices, Quality and Square Dealing in Trade.

A branch of the Kewanee Club, a business organization enjoying considerable popularity in the United States and Canada, was organized at noon today at the Tecumseh House, with more than 50 charter members. The election of officers will take place at the next meeting, which will be called by the nominating committee.

The chief address was delivered by Mr. T. Brown of Buffalo, one of the leading spirits in the organization in the United States. The club is two years old, the first three cities to have branches being Detroit, Cleveland and Pittsburgh. Now there are 83, including organizations in Toronto and Hamilton. It was, he said, not merely a trade or boost organization, but a business organization, organized to help others in business, mutual self help, but its objects were greater. It was to provide an organization that would result in fair prices, quality and square dealing in business.

Business Ethics committees were organized to protect the people. There were over 12,000 members now, and a monthly paper devoted to the interests of the organization was published. There were no salaries officials outside the organizing branch.

REEVE OF TILBURY MAY BECOME WARDEN

Much Speculation as to Who Will Head Kent Council.

Wilson of Tilbury on the ground that the town has not had the wardenship at any time. Other candidates who are considered are Reeve Pardo of Raleigh, Reeve Brion of Ridgeway, and Reeve Miller of Chatham Township.

The county authorities are still working on clues furnished by the Detroit police for the arrest of De Bruin, a Belgian, who is alleged to have killed another Belgian in a Detroit saloon some weeks ago. It was thought that the wanted man is in hiding near his brothers in Wallacburg.

SAYS BARN FIRE WAS NOT INCENDIARY'S WORK

Deputy Marshal Makes Investigation at Tiltsburg.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TILTSBURG, Jan. 4.—Deputy Fire Marshal Dickey of Toronto has been in town since Tuesday evening investigating the fire in the barn of T. Sitts on Sunday evening. Mr. Sitts discovered the blaze in the cow barn and aroused the neighbors, who were unable to extinguish it before much damage was done. Mr. Dickey and Chief Patten visited the scene of the fire and had an interview with Mr. Sitts, and some of the neighbors, and this afternoon handed the following signed information to the press:

"I visited the barn where the fire was today, with Mr. Dickey, and I believe that the best conclusion is that the fire was caused by a spark of a pipe or match, possibly dropped by someone who was having a few days before," George Patten.

Mr. Dickey had with him a piece of bit burned to charcoal, which indicated the fire had smoldered for some time. He left for a western point this afternoon.

Pointing out the value of these new industries to the city, Mr. Philip compares them with the military camps which have been here for some time. He says there was keen competition for two years for these military camps with their large pay rolls and big expenditures for supplies. But these were only temporary, whereas the factories are to be permanent, and will be ever increasing in their value to London. Industrial prospects here, he says, are only limited by the willingness of the people to cooperate. Firms are knocking at the doors, ready to locate, if only the city will grant them some privileges, but these are too often denied. Hundreds of acres of land are tied up, the owners asking prohibitive prices, thus preventing the purchase of manufacturing purposes. However, a start has been made, and better things are anticipated.

All other factors except the chance of peace negotiations and the outlook for continued European buying were virtually ignored.

Opening prices, which ranged from 1c to 1 1/2c, were followed by a slight general advance, and the situation was somewhat around to well below yesterday's close.
