1.712 More District Men Lay Claim to Exemption Today.

ONLY 578 WAIVED SO FAR

But Three More Days Before Those Who Fail to Report Come Under Penalties.

The largest number of forms received in any one day since the military ser-vice act went into effect were filed of today at the office of the deputy registrar when 1,712 claims for exemption and 83 reports for service were

The total number of claims for exemption now on hand is 21,627, as compared with 578 persons who have signed a form stating their willingness to serve as a soldier or in any military capacity in which they may be required.

According to the present ratio it is expected that the tribunals will have at least 30,000 claims for exemption to deal with throughout the district. With but three more days remaining it is urged upon those who have not yet signed a form to do so without further delay.

Attempt to bribe any member of an exemption tribunal, medical board or military representative—a term of imprisonment not exceeding five years and not less than one year.

The needed total of \$30,000 for the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. is apparently assured by Wednesday night, when the teams meet again for the final get together supper at the "Y." Some strenuous spurts must be made, however, by the teams, if the Italian Red Cross is to receive an additional \$10,000 as London's gift for humanitarian work among the stricken soldiers of England's worthy and hardpressed ally, and the \$40,000 goal of the present three in-one campaign be thus reached.

A total of \$15,147.37 in hand as a result of the first day of the combined canvass by the men's and women's teams was announced at last night's supper at the Y. M. C. A. President Yendall, as chairman of the campaign committee, expressed himself as confident of the final outcome.

Will Reach Objective.

"That the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. will achieve their desired goals of \$20,000 and \$10,000, respectively, I am confident," he said. "If a substantial sum is not realized as a result of this effort for the Italian Red Cross we must 'carry on.' If not at this time, in the immediate future. London must do its bit for Italy, as have the other cities of Ontario; as the city has done for the Belgian, French, Serbian and other funds of our allies. Italy needs today—now—as never before."
