

HALIFAX REQUIRES 300 CARPENTERS TO ASSIST REBUILDING

Three hundred carpenters from this city are required for work at Halifax immediately. John Farrell, head of the local office of the Ontario employment bureau received word from Col. Bob Low, officer in charge of the work at Halifax, that the bureau is required to send three hundred, skilled carpenters and handymen this week. The rate of pay will be 40 cents per hour, and the first installment of men will be sent to the Eastern coast city Tuesday afternoon via G. T. R.

The need for workmen is urgent, sufficient material to build armies of men at work for the next month has been secured, and the sooner the necessary labor is forthcoming the more expeditious will be the rebuilding of Halifax. Other workmen than carpenters are not required for the present.

The men who volunteer to help in the reconstruction of the city will be given free transportation and board estimated to be equivalent to five dollars extra per week. By this the practical rate of pay will be 45 cents per hour.

For the past three weeks intimations have been received at the employment bureau that men would be needed at any moment. Two hundred laborers manifested a desire to accept jobs at Halifax, but only fifty per cent of these were carpenters.

The scarcity of building material at Halifax until now has been such that laborers were not wanted. However, thousands of tons of lumber and bricks have been forwarded to the unfortunate city in the past week with the result that laborers are much in demand.

BROTHER OF "SEVEN BABIES" OUT BOOSTING FOR BABY WELFARE WEEK TO BE HELD IN LONDON

The "little" inquirer then told about the exhibit with its moving pictures and the clinics, where babies will be weighed and their heads and chest measurements taken, as well as heart action, and so on, to find how nearly they measure up to being prize babies.

The enthusiast explained in detail. When it came to the mental and dental tests, "That's our baby, seven months old," he said, eagerly, then he continued reading, "Sit alone!"—on that.

"What grade are you in at school?" "Fourth," was the hopeful reply.

"I am afraid," began the lady, but noting the look of utter disappointment stopped.

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STORM PLAYED HAVOC WITH ATTENDANCE AT DIFFERENT CHURCHES

Morning Congregations Were Smallest in Years.

Only a sprinkling of the usual congregation was present in the forenoon at St. Andrew's Church, though there was a good congregation in the evening. The organ dedication and opening of Ridgway Street Church was postponed owing to the inclement weather.

Yesterday was anniversary day in Colborne Street Methodist Church, and on this account considerable disappointment was felt, and a musical service which had been planned for the morning congregation was postponed.

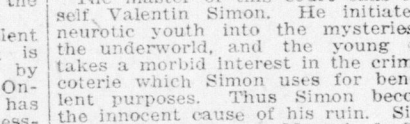
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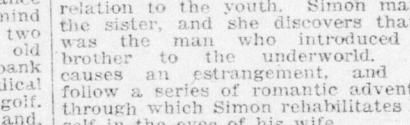
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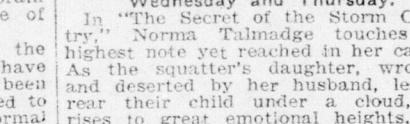
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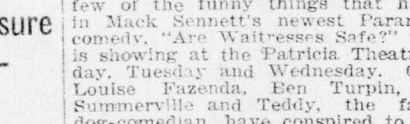
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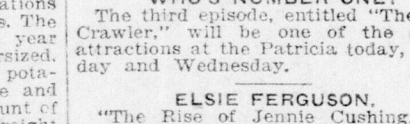
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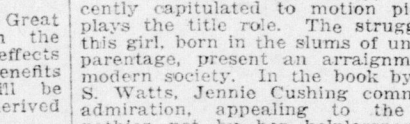
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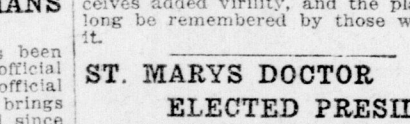
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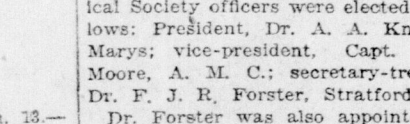
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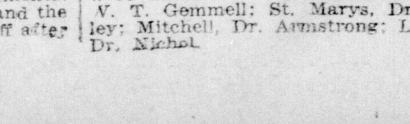
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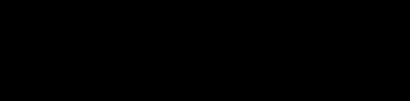
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LEUT. FRAME DIES HERE AFTER LENGTHY ILLNESS
