



Employers Voices Their
Oppositin.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 24.—(By staff correspondent Canadian Press. Limited.)—Canadian Government delegates will vote for the proposed convention on the eight-hour day. At the international labor conference this afternoon, Hon. Newton Wesley Rowell clearly and unequivocally stated the proposed convention of the Doministon of the Statement, At the conclusion of the statement,

S. R. Parsons, Canadian employers' delegate, had read a statement giving the Canadian employers' view.

"Mr. Parsons," Mr. Rowell said, "has very properly presented the views of the employers, but in the last analysis the governments in the different countries concerned must determine the policy of the country, and my colleague.

At the conclusion of the statement, Mr. Barnes, British Government delegate, "reminded" Mr. Parsons that all signatories of the peace treaty had agreed to nine principles, included among which were the eight-hour day and 48-hour, week. Indeed, the general principle of the eight-hour day had been worn threadbare in the week's general discussion by the conference was the discussion of the convention clause by clause. clause by clause.

Amendment Carried.

H. Warrington Smith, delegate from the South African Government, moved an amendment to the convention referring the application of the eight-hour day, so far as workers engaged in transport or inland waterways were concerned, to the special committee which is to investigate application of the eight-hour day to seamen. Mr. Rowell spoke in favor of the amendment. Seamen engaged in navigation of inland waters, he submitted, should stand in the same relation as those engaged. the South African Government, moved stand in the same relation as those engaged in ocean navigation. The amend-ment was carried.

Mr. Crawford, workers' delegate from South Africa, moved an amendment to make the convention apply to indus-trial work done in the home. The questrial work done in the nome. The question, Mr. Crawford said, was whether the onus for recognition of "sweating" should be upon the conference. As it stood the convention was not applicable to work in which only members of the family were employed. The inclusion of these words in the convention. Mr. Crawford argued, was an encouragement to sweating. What was the use of shortening hours in the factories, he

of shortening hours in the factories, he asked, if the workers' strength was to be exhausted by working long hours in unhealthy abodes?

Mr. Crawford's amendment was lost. An amendment by Gino Baldesi, Italian workers' delegate, that "no decrease in wages by day or by week can be admitted by the workers," was declared out of order. The conference adjourned until tomorrow morning,
